DOUGLAS COUNTY SLOGAN CONTEST WILL BE STARTED

Chamber of Commerce to Offer Prize for Best Slogan Submitted Before April 30.

A slogan is wanted for Douglas county. Other communities have advertising slogans which are of inestimable value to them, but Douglas county has never had one which could be used successfully. The Chamber of Commerce is now starting a contest in which a prize is offered for the best slogan submitted. The contest will close on Friday, April 30, and the prize will be awarded at the regular meeting of the directors on the first Tuesday in May.

Grants Pass has proven the benefit of a slogan with its well known expression "It's the Cl-ri-ty." Those three words have accomplished wonders in drawing people to that enterprising city. Other cities have slogans of like nature, drawing attention to some particular feature.

Such a slogan is in reality a trademark and is a valuable asset in the way of drawing attention to the particular locality. In order that some such expression may be secured for use in advertising Douglas county the Chamber of Commerce is offering a prize of \$10 for the best one submitted.

Any contestant may submit as many suggested slogans as desired. These must be mailed or delivered to the Chamber of Commerce office on or before April 30. The contest is open to every resident of Douglas county, and the winning slogan will be selected by a board of impartial and representative judges composed of Dexter Rice, B. W. Bates, E. B. Stewart, C. H. Bailey and Mrs. J. C. Ponder. No slogan is to be of more than 25 words in length. It must be applicable to Douglas county as a whole, and not just to Roseburg alone, and it is desired that it contain words calling attention to Douglas county's climate, soil, resources, or some other outstanding feature.

After the slogan has been selected the merchants of the city will be requested to use it in their advertising, and in their letterheads, and on their envelopes, while it will be broadcast also in many other ways. A supply of script style name plates with the slogan attached will be secured and may be purchased by auto owners.

CHESTER KUBLI LOSES ON APPEAL IN SUPREME COURT

SALEM, Ore., April 20.—Chester Kubli must be imprisoned in the Oregon penitentiary for aiding and abetting in the wrecking of the Jacksonville State Bank.

Frederick L. Miller, Portland jeweler, must serve time in the state prison for running down and causing the death of Mrs. Alma Hall while driving his automobile on Sandy road.

In both of these cases the state supreme court today handed down oral opinions denying petitions for rehearing. Strong efforts are being made by both Kubli and Miller to get pardons from the governor. Kubli was sentenced to serve three years in the penitentiary and Miller one year. In the latter case leniency was recommended by the jury. The charge was involuntary manslaughter. It happened January 23, 1924.

Motion for a new trial was filed by Butchek's attorney.

After killing his wife Butchek went to a barber shop to get a shave before going to the police station to give himself up.

COL. WILLIAMS IS
SILENT ON VERDICT

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 20.—Colonel Alexander S. Williams will know within a week or two whether he is to be dismissed from the marine corps, reduced in rank or dropped to lower altitude on the promotion list for being drunk on the night he gave a dinner party in honor of Brigadier General Smedley D. Butler.

The Colonel's conviction on a charge of intoxication preferred by General Butler was revealed yesterday when the court martial trying his case adjourned without saying what, if any, verdict it had reached.

Colonel Williams declined to comment on the outcome of his trial.

PERCY WEBB TO
TAKE MANAGERSHIP
OF DOUGLAS HOTEL

Percy Webb, who for several months has been serving as a member of the city police force, last night tendered his resignation, and is to accept the managership of the Douglas Hotel. Mr. Webb was manager of the hotel for several years, but a few months ago was forced to resign because of ill health. He will succeed N. C. Huell, the present manager, who has resigned, the resignation being effective as soon as he can be relieved.

Under the new arrangement the force at the hotel will be increased, in anticipation of the tourist season. Three clerks will be employed, each working 8-hour shifts, making a considerable increase in the force. Several other changes are contemplated.

Grant Wilcox has been appointed by Mayor Houck to take the place on the police force made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Webb.

Mr. Huell who is retiring from the hotel management is planning to enter business within the very near future. He has not yet completed his plans, and is uncertain as to his future location, but has determined to engage in the mercantile trade during the present spring.
