STARTS AT ARMORY THIS AFTERNOON

Fine Exhibits of Oregon Goods to Be Found in Display Now Open to the Public.

The spacious auditorium of the Armory was today converted into a beautiful exhibit room for Oregon products. The show which is sponsored by the Roseburg Women's Club started very auspiciously, and with liberal patronage, particularly on the part of exhibitors. Many interesting, unique and attractive displays are to be found, although some of the exhibitors were late in getting their booths set up and in order.

A spectator is immediately impressed by the great amount of produce which is Oregon grown or manufactured, as shown by this large exhibition. It is evident that the Oregon empire produces practically all necessities of life, and that its potential manufacturing resources are astounding, when realization is prompted by the magnificent display now open to the public.

This show is prompted purely by a desire on the part of the club to promote interest in Oregon products. No charge is made either for admission or exhibit space, the only cost being for refreshments, which may be procured if desired. Interesting programs have been arranged for both afternoon and evening, the evening entertainment starting at 7:30 o'clock. Dan C. Freeman, manager of the Oregon Manufacturers association, is to be the chief speaker at both programs. It is hoped that the residents of the county afford this show the greatest cooperation, as it is to be made an annual event if the support given by the popular warrants reputation.

POWERS MAN UNDER ARREST FOR ALLEGED THEFT OF AUTO

Sam Price, a resident of Powers, was arrested today upon a warrant sworn out by Sheriff Starnmer, charging him with the theft of a car belonging to Clifford Boyle, Roseburg Postal Clerk. Mr. Boyle's car was stolen two weeks ago and was traced to Powers, where it was found abandoned. Sheriff Starnmer in investigating the case found that it was driven to Powers by a man alleged to be Sam Price, and that it was impounded in a collision near the limits of that city, the accident leading to the man's apprehension. Price, according to Sheriff Starnmer, made a statement at Coquille, following his arrest, that the car was stolen by another man, and that he (Price) was a passenger out of Roseburg. The machine was abandoned by the real thief, Price is said to have declared, and the latter purchased gas and drove the car on into Powers and left it there. Sheriff Starnmer will leave for Coquille tomorrow to bring Price to this city.
