UNIFIED TRAFFIC LAWS, SIMPLIFIED, RAFFETY'S VIEWS

EUGENE, Ore., April 22.—That care should be taken in the making of legislative measures regulating traffic, so as to avoid confusion and complication; that laws ought to be simplified so officers and citizens alike may understand them; that all states should as nearly as possible conform to a universal code for the operation of motor vehicles, thus reducing accidents, decreasing the loss of life and property and that the public be educated regarding traffic regulations and informed of the many accidents and their consequences, were among the points brought out in a talk by E. A. Rafferty, chief of the state traffic department, who spoke before the luncheon of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce today. His topic was "Policy and Attitude of the Department on Traffic."

HENRY R. CRAWFORD ON STATE FAIR BOARD

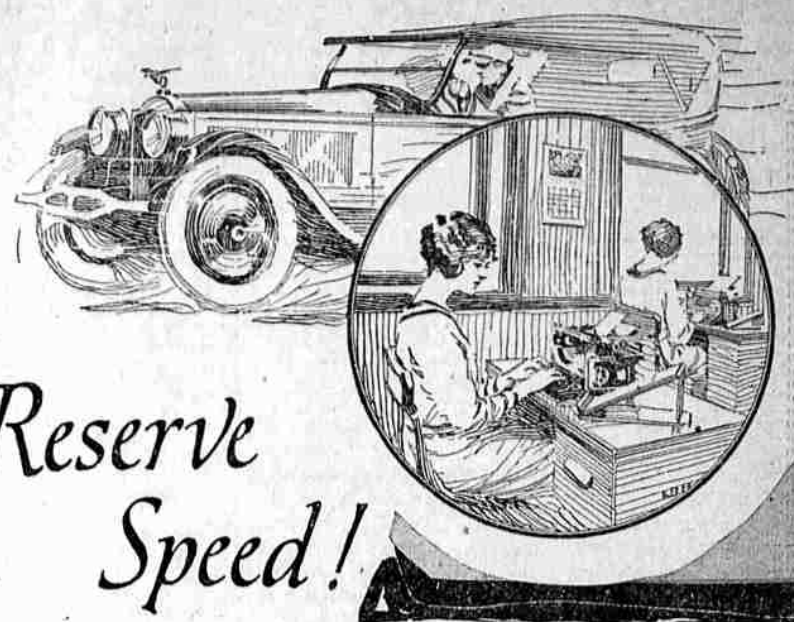
