FACING CHARGE; WOMAN INVOLVED

SASKATOON, Sask., April 24.—Mrs. A. C. Luffman of this city, whose husband is held at Oakland, Cal., on a charge of entering the United States illegally, said today that he left her after arranging for a three months' leave of absence from St. Andrews Theological College in Saskatoon in 1924, explaining he needed a rest.

Mrs. W. E. McConnell, who was questioned by the Oakland police, was a school teacher at Humboldt, Sask., former home of the Luffmans and lived with them. Mrs. Luffman said he was an Englishman, 37, and had been in Canada 16 years.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 24.—Rev. Arthur C. Luffman, former pastor of a church in Humboldt, province of Saskatchewan, Canada, is in custody at the Immigration station on Angel Island in San Francisco Bay today, while the Department of Labor in Washington

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING TO BE HELD AT ONCE

Chairman to Call Special Session First of Next Week.

DALLYING DENIED

Claim of Purposeful Absence Not Correct Director Says—Will Attend to Business.

A special meeting of the school board for the purpose of transacting such business as may be demanding attention will be called for the first part of next week, according to an announcement made today by Dr. S. L. DeLapp, chairman of the board.

Recently the school board had locked over the appointment of a director to fill the place made vacant by the departure of Director Reese, and since that time it has been impossible to secure a quorum for the transaction of business. Statements have been made that Directors DeLapp and Byrd purposely absented themselves in order to prevent action on the appointment of a director, leaving other matters without attention. No quorum was present for the meeting on last Tuesday or at the special meeting called on Thursday by the clerk.

Chairman DeLapp stated today that he will call a meeting as soon as convenient for all members and that such a meeting will take place early next week. At that time an effort will be made to settle the existing difficulties, and the routine business will be transacted.

Dr. DeLapp, in a communication addressed to the News-Review, states that he was out of town on the night of the regular meeting on Tuesday, and that the special meeting called by the clerk was apparently intended to be held during his absence.

His communication regarding the matter is as follows:

"I desire to correct certain statements relative to the school board which appeared in yesterday's (Friday) issue of the News-Review.

"Business requiring my presence in Portland Wednesday morning, I was obliged to be absent from Roseburg Tuesday evening, and knowing that I should be unable to attend a school board meeting, I arranged with Superintendent Hamm to take care of all pressing school matters before leaving on Tuesday. With affairs thus arranged Directors Goddess and Byrd agreed with me that Tuesday's meeting might be called off. The clerk and city superintendent were apprised of this arrangement. The individual who furnished information to the News-Review was obviously not in touch with the facts.

"I do not and have not opposed the selection of a director to fill the vacancy caused by the departure of Mr. J. D. Reese. Just why such frantic haste should have been shown by one member in inducing the clerk to call a special board meeting in my absence, seems a bit irregular, to say the least.

"Arriving home Thursday afternoon, I received notice of this most critically urgent meeting. The unparalleled rush in calling this meeting leaves little doubt that it was intended to take place in my absence. Since the foregoing procedure seemed to indicate that my absence at this particular meeting was desired, I remained at home.

"I believe the records will show that I am the only member of the school board who has not missed a single meeting of the board during the past year.

"As chairman of the school board, I am quite conversant with all the business coming before it, and I do not know of any matter that has been or is now being neglected.

"The charge of politics destroying peace and efficiency of the school board is a real news. That is one matter that has not been discussed during my brief three years' connection with the board.

"My few years of observation and scrutiny on the school board has taught me that a good board member should be entirely impervious to adverse criticism, should never make mistakes and in short, should be void of any and all human weaknesses.

"And finally, brethren, lest any should forget, please be advised that all who are open season on school board members. Never withhold your fire. Always bag the limit. All school board members soon become more or less insane, and insane men are dangerous; therefore, let none escape.

NEW YORK, April 24.—Suzanne Lenglen, after playing Helen Wills twice more perhaps, is to make a six months tour of the United States, it was announced by Charles C. Pyle, Red Grange's manager. Her tour will begin in July. She will play the leading role in a film which will probably be based upon her book, "The Love Game," and she will play exhibition tennis.

EX-COMMISSIONER OF COUNTY DIES AT HIS HOME IN RIDDLE

Louis Ash, one of the most prominent pioneer residents of the Riddle valley, died this morning after a short illness. Mr. Ash, who was almost 90 years of age, came to Riddle over 50 years ago. He was engaged in mining at Jacksonville in the early days, and later took up a farm of more than 1,000 acres in the Riddle valley. From 1886 until 1890 he served as county commissioner for Douglas county, and during his lifetime held many other positions of public trust in the community in which he resided. He was a veteran of the Civil war.

His passing away a number of years ago, and following that bereavement he retired from active life, dividing his property up among his four children, three of whom still reside on the home place. The four surviving children are A. H. and Y. D. Ash, and Mrs. Joe and Mrs. Charles Monsthal, all of Riddle. The funeral services will be held at Riddle Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

BRIEF SPORT NEWS

CLAREMONT, Cal., April 24.—Charles Paddock, champion sprinter, faced fleet competition on the cinder path here today in an attempt to shatter the world's record of 9.3 seconds for the 100-yard dash which he and two others hold.

His opponents in the dash were Hugh Pinney, star Pomona College sprinter and Murray Schultz, California Institute of Technology running ace.

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
