NEW LAND FRAUD

LOS ANGELES, April 26.—W. H. O'Bryan, formerly of Oregon, and Mrs. Ina M. Harper of Hollywood, have been indicted here by the federal grand jury charged with using the mails to defraud in connection with sale of land on Palmito del Verde, an island of the west coast of Mexico.

Mrs. Harper and O'Bryan were indicted on the same charges last October but a re-indictment was asked by government attorneys on the ground that the original bill contained legal irregularities. The two are accused of having sold 35,000 acres of land on the island at from \$20 to \$50 an acre, representing it to be highly fertile. Advertisements characterized it as a second Garden of Eden. Government attorneys stated the land was

not fertile and the island was infested by myriads of insects. It was charged that sales totaling \$200,000 were made in Salem, Ore., and Yakima, Wash., the investigation by the government having been made at the request of the Salem buyers.

SEEK COOPERATION.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 26.—Cooperation of California in bringing about completion of The Dalles-Reno-Los Angeles highway will be sought by Governor Walter M. Pierce, he announced in a talk here last evening. He is here for a forestry meeting. "There is need for an interstate highway east of the Cascades and Sierras and the route mentioned would supply a traffic artery sure to attract thousands of tourists, as well as aid residents along its route," Governor Pierce said.
