APPEAL IS MADE

FOR GOLDEN RULE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
TORONTO, Ont., April 27. — An appeal of the adoption of the golden rule in international politics, made by Sir Esme Howard, the British ambassador to the United States in an address today before the Canadian Rotary and Empire clubs of Toronto.

There can be no peace, he asserted, "if all nations are always bent on having their own way in international affairs," and he urged that an attempt be made to understand the point of view of others, since some sacrifice "is almost always necessary in any fair and square deal."

Evolution of the British empire, its relations with the United States, and the maintenance of peace in Europe were described by the ambassador as the three greatest political questions of the near future, and he looked to Canada to play a considerable part in keeping Anglo-American relations on a "sound, healthy and friendly footing."

"The one possible source of trouble that I can see in the future might arise out of economic competition," he continued. "It seems to me that without doubt the struggle for markets in the future will be more acute and more violent than in the past. It will need the most patient and the most calm spirit of statesmanship to deal with such questions."

The war he said, disclosed that isolation was impossible for England and that "in order to assist in maintaining peace in Europe, we must continue to be intimately connected with all its affairs."

CONGRESSMAN TO GIVE SUPPORT TO GRANT LAND BILL

Congressmen W. C. Hawley and N. J. Sennott will each work for the passage of the grant land tax bill, according to letters received from them by H. O. Pargeter, secretary of the Douglas County Taxpayers' League.

"I have introduced a bill in the house, and in order to inform the department before they reported on the bill of the merits and justice of the proposed legislation I arranged for a hearing with the secretary of the interior and his chief officials last Friday," Representative Hawley writes. "At my suggestion we also had a hearing before General Lord, director of the budget, on Saturday, and presented the matter to them. Since the other bill was adversely reported on, it is very important to secure a favorable report on mine, so the above measures were taken. I will continue to give the matter attention and do all I can to secure the passage of the legislation."

N. J. Sennott writes, "I wish to assure that I shall do what I can in behalf of this legislation."

OPPOSES MODIFICATION.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 27.—Senator McNary will oppose any modification to weaken the federal law, he has informed Rose City Park Presbyterian Church in answer to a resolution passed by the church asking Oregon's congressional delegation to take such a stand. His telegram follows:

"Thank you for the resolution. I am wholly in sympathy with you in this important matter and shall oppose any legislation to weaken the prohibition laws."

CHAMPION POLE VAULTER ACCOUNTS BEING WATCHED

SEATTLE, April 27.—No money will be paid by the University of Washington, Darwin Meisner, Husky graduate manager, announced today to Charles Hoff of Norway, world champion pole vaulter, without approval of Murray Hulbert of New York City, president of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States.

Arrangement was made ten days ago, specifying that Hoff render an account of his expenses after the relay carnival. This account is submitted to Hulbert by telegraph and on his telegraphed approval, Hoff is paid.

CONTROL OF PEA APHIDS (By B. W. Cooney)

Aphids infest a large number of trees, shrubs, vines and vegetable crops and are directly responsible for heavy losses of crops each year. Aphids attacking field crops are very difficult to control owing to the equipment necessary in applying the sprays or dusts. On the other hand this pest can be readily controlled by contact sprays. In considering the feeding habits of this insect we find it feeds by puncturing the leaves and stems of its host. This habit makes it immune to any type of poison sprays, as it is not necessary to be killed by direct contact to its body of some type of spray or dust that suffocates.

A large number of spray materials have been found effective when properly made and applied. All materials, however, have their limitations and it resolves itself into the selection of one or two of the most efficient. Possibly black leaf forty or nicotine sulphate has given the best results. This material is quite costly but small quantities can be made effective. It has the advantage of killing aphids quickly in either liquid or dust form. We find that nicotine dust made on a 5 per cent basis is very effective against pea aphids. The dust has the advantage of liquid materials in that a greater area of the plant or tree can be covered at a minimum of time and labor. Nictotine dust can be bought no doubt from local dealers at reasonable cost. It can be made by anyone who is willing to follow these directions. Take hydrated lime 12 pounds, nicotine sulphate or black leaf 40 10 ounces, mix together and place in a two-gallon friction top can or bucket with a tight lid for further mixing, as follows:

Place ten or twelve stones about the size of a small hen egg in the bucket with the lime and black leaf, then rotate the bucket or can for one or two minutes. The stones will cut through the dust in the receptacle and thoroughly mix the blackleaf through the lime, which is very necessary for a good killing dust. The stones can be removed by hand or screen. Keep the nicotine dust in a tight container until used.

Lead arsenic can be added to this formula if troubled with chewing insects. Add the lead arsenic at the rate of one pound.

Many types of dusts are on the market, ranging from the small hand outfit, costing a small sum to the larger types as the knapsack and power dusters.

This formula can be successfully used for control of many fungus diseases when increased 50% by fine dusting sulphur. Growers
