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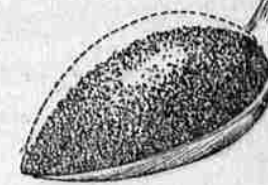

LEBANON MAN
BUYS BIG FARM
NEAR MELROSE

Axe and Pick Handle Industry to Be Associated With Clearing Land on Cooper Tract.

An important business deal involving a small industry was consummated today when John L. Ray, of Lebanon, purchased the 440-acre ranch at Melrose, the place formerly having been owned by G. W. Cooper. Mr. Ray has as his associate in the transaction Mr. Frank Warner of Lebanon, who is an expert shaker of axe and pick handles.

Mr. Ray has been in the blacksmith and machine shop business in Lebanon for the past 26 years. Prior to that time he was located on a farm near that place. An ailment of the eyes brought on by his work in the machine shop, caused him to come to Roseburg for a visit, and he was greatly surprised to find his condition immediately benefited in this climate. Because of this fact he at once made arrangements to retire from his business and resume agricultural work and to this end has purchased the Cooper place.

The property includes 440 acres, having 140 acres river bottom land and the rest bench and pasture land. The place is well stocked, and equipped and Mr. Ray acquired the sheep and cattle together with all buildings, etc. There are three sets of buildings on the farm. The amount involved is about \$18,000. Mr. Cooper takes in trade Mr. Ray's business and residence property in Lebanon, and also a cash consideration.

Mr. Cooper does not intend to leave Douglas county, and has already taken steps to lease the business and the residence property at Lebanon. He will purchase a small farm in this county, the condition of his health forcing him to give up his large place and move to property that does not demand so much of his time and attention.

Mr. Ray plans to add to the stock on the property and to make other substantial improvement. There is a large woodlot on the premises and from this he will cut wood for consumption in Roseburg. The white oak will be used by Mr. Warner in the manufacture of axe and pick handles, a trade in which he is classed as a expert. He has been engaged in that work in Lebanon for a number of years and his goods have been in great demand by the contracting firms all over that county, as his hand made implement handles are said to be far superior to the machine made articles. As the Cooper

place affords a large amount of choice white oak which is particularly desirable for the kind of work in which Mr. Warner will engage, it is possible that a very good industry may be developed. The negotiations, which have

been pending for a considerable length of time, were consummated by the McLondon real estate company. For results use News-Review classified ads.



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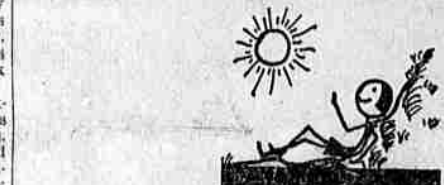
