POWERS ROAD IMPROVEMENT DIST. LIMITED

Orders Cannot Be Drawn Until Funds Are Available Atty. Gen. Says.

WARRANTS NOT VOID

Directors Have No Power to Issue Warrants Until After Money Has Been Collected.

The Umpqua Road Improvement District cannot borrow money from the county or the state, and cannot issue warrants against a future tax collection, according to a decision handed down by Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle at the request of District Attorney Corbin.

The directors of the road district recently held a meeting in Roseburg and discussed the matter of raising money to proceed with work this year. It was the opinion of the directors that the district should not issue bonds and it was thought possible that warrants could be issued and marked "not paid for lack of funds," and held by the purchasers as negotiable securities until the tax collection could be made.

It was also suggested that the county could advance the funds for work this year, but the court questioned its power to do so even should the county have money available.

According to the opinion of the attorney general none of these courses are open. Orders may be drawn, the attorney general says, only to the extent of funds in the hands of the state treasurer to the credit of the district.

New construction work must be contracted by the district through the highway commission, the attorney general states, while maintenance and repair work can be done through either the state commission or the county court.

The attorney general's opinion in full, directed to the district attorney, is as follows:

I have your letter of the 8th instant respecting the rights of the board of trustees of a special road district formed under the provisions of chapter 299, General Laws of 1921, in the expenditure of funds.

"May the president and secretary of this highway improvement district, by authority of the board of trustees, now sign orders upon the state treasurer to be paid out of the taxes collected by such district upon the 1926 tax roll, payable to such persons as may be willing to advance money upon such orders, and negotiate the same, the funds to be used under the provisions of said act?"

Section 25 of chapter 299, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, reads as follows: "The proceeds derived from the sale of all bonds, together with all money received from taxes collected by any corporation under the provisions of this act, shall be paid to the state treasurer of the state of Oregon and by him kept as a trust fund to the credit of such corporation and to be disbursed upon the order signed by the president and secretary of such corporation, by authority of the board of trustees."

Certain powers and duties of the board of trustees of such a district as well as of the state highway commission, are enumerated in section 26, among which are the following:

"It shall then be the duty of the state highway commission to proceed with the construction of the improvement of any such road the same as the construction of any state highway, but to the extent only of the funds in the hands of the state treasurer to the credit of any such corporation. Funds to be derived from the state highway commission of the amount of money due upon and such improvement, including the making of plans and specifications, location and survey, it shall be the duty of the president and secretary of such corporation to draw an order upon the state treasurer in favor of the state highway commission for the amount of money so certified to be due for such construction or improvement, including the making of the location and survey, and the plans and specifications."

From a reading of the entire chapter it appears that the only construction or improvement of roads which the trustees of such a road district can make, is through the state highway commission, as indicated in section 26, and the construction and maintenance of roads may be accomplished by contract either with the state highway commission or the county court. (See Sec. 27). Also that no orders may be drawn upon trust funds in the hands of the state treasurer to the credit of such corporation.

Also I find no authority provided anywhere in the statute for the trustees of such a district borrowing money by means of the sale of orders on the fund of such district. It must be remembered that the powers of statutory officers must be granted by the statute or they do not exist. Such powers are not only created, but also limited by the statute creating them. I must therefore answer this

question in the negative.

Second: "If you answer the first inquiry in the affirmative, will the state treasurer have authority to endorse said orders 'Not paid for want of funds,' and, if so, will such orders bear interest?"

I must also answer this question in the negative for the reason that paragraph 3 of section 2731, Oregon Laws, which authorized the endorsement of state warrants and the payment of interest thereon after such endorsement, was amended by chapter 195, page 286, laws of 1923, so that it does not now contain any provision authorizing such endorsement or payment of interest, but requires the state treasurer to borrow money for the benefit of the general fund whenever necessary and pay all warrants thereon in cash. This latter provision does not inure to the benefit of special funds. Nevertheless, the provision for endorsement of warrants on the state treasurer and the payment of interest thereon, is no longer found in the law.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO LIST FARM LAND

Will Obtain Descriptions of Rural Property Offered for Sale.

SETTLERS WANTED

Effort to Be Made to Induce Farmers From Other States to Locate in Douglas County.

The Chamber of Commerce is desirous of securing listings on farm land which is for sale in Douglas county. These listings will be held open for the information and advice of homeseekers endeavoring to find a suitable location.

This is being done as a part of the land settlement work of the chamber of commerce and will doubtless be a great aid in securing new settlers.

The state chamber publishes a booklet, or price list, once each year. This price list contains the listings of farms, which are offered for sale all over the county, containing a short description of each place and the amount asked by the owner.

In each locality there is an appraisal board which has looked over the listings, ascertaining that the land is of the reasonable value named by the owner, and that it is suitable for settlement and that the description is accurate.

With this authority the booklet is mailed to any prospective settler, who can then take up direct with the chamber of commerce the matter of purchasing any property in which he may be interested. This work is usually carried on through the real estate dealers in each community, working in cooperation with the chamber of commerce. Locally, however, the listings will be obtained direct, as an appeal to the real estate dealers has not been effective, according to Secretary Cully of the local chamber.

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce has been endeavoring for several weeks to obtain listings and has called meetings of the committee, inviting the real estate dealers to be present. The meetings, however, were not attended, and subsequently in another effort, listing blanks were mailed out, but no response was received from these.

In order to obtain the listings the chamber of commerce will appeal directly to the property owners. Persons having farm property for sale are asked to mail to the chamber of commerce a description of the place together with the price asked. An appraisal will be made to see that the listings are in order and it will then be filed on the listing blanks.

It is probably too late to place the listings on the booklet this year, as it is soon to be published, in fact, has been held up awaiting word from Douglas county. Such listings, however, as are received will be kept on file in the office and will be open to all who are interested in settling in the county.

The chamber of commerce is anxious to settle up the farm land. It is felt that the greater number of settlers, the greater will be the amount of produce. A larger volume of produce will demand a larger market, and a closer organized producing industry, which will all work to the advantage and benefit of the farming community.

It is felt that the greatest opportunity for bringing new settlers into the state and because of this fact the local chamber is determined that the work shall be successfully undertaken here, and the organization will assume upon itself, if necessary, the task of placing prospective settlers in touch with the land owners, and in aiding them in locating in the county and establishing themselves as producers.

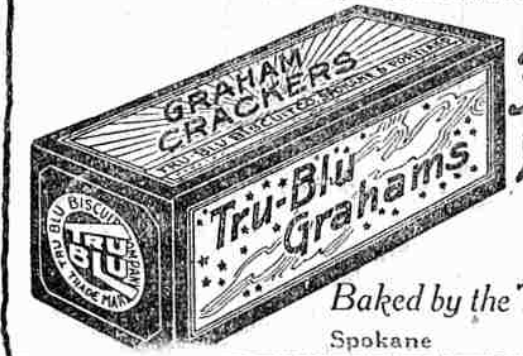

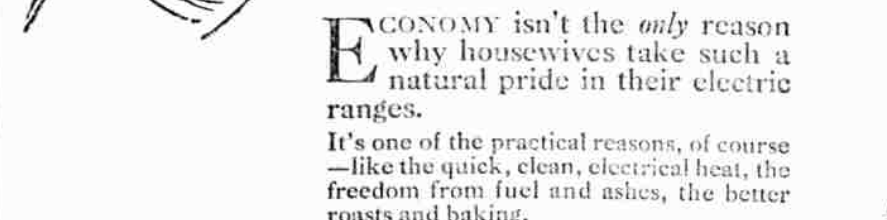
ACCUSED OF MURDER.
