ROME, April 28.—A descendant of two Presidents of the United States is in jail here. He is John Adams Abbott of Boston, Mass. His forebears were Presidents John Adams and John Quincy Adams. He is accused of beating Salvatore Astrologo, a Roman guide, who came to his hotel and invited him out for a fight after a dispute regarding precedence in entering the Vatican Garden. Abbott is on a tour of Italy with his mother, Mrs. Gratton St. Lee Abbott and readily admits that he polished off the guide with his fists. He denies, however, that he used derogatory remarks against Premier Mussolini. The station judicial authorities informed the American consulate this morning that Abbott must remain in jail until his formal interrogation tomorrow or Friday.

DANCER TELLS HOW TO HAVE GOOD LOOKING FEET

"A pretty girl without a good looking foot is like a ship without an anchor," says Madge Evans of the George White Scandals company, which will be at the Auditorium Theatre on Saturday, May 1. SENIORS LEADING IN HIGH SCHOOL TRACK; HOLD MEET

The interclass track meet of the Roseburg high school is now half completed, seven events remaining yet to be run off.
