PHYSICAL CULTURE CLASS ORGANIZED HERE

It was recently proposed that a physical culture class be organized for the development and physical training of girls and women of Roseburg, and last night the organization of such a class was effected, when about thirty-five young ladies met at the band rehearsal hall and discussed the proposed plans of training.

A. T. Lawrence, who is one of the organizers, will have charge of the training of the class, which will meet one hour on one night of each week at the K. P. hall. Mr. Lawrence is devoting his time and experience gratis, as a missionary work to the community, and there will be no expense aside of the fee of ten cents for each student for the rental of the hall each week. While physical education has been effected in the high school during the past year, young women who are not attending, and those who are working, have had no means of receiving such benefits, and the present plan is one which will greatly benefit the young women of the community in receiving instructions on the lines of how to perfect health.

The meeting last night was a very enthusiastic one and those present were eager to enroll in the class. Girls between the ages of 15 to 25 years are eligible to become members of this class, and

those present last night are now working to make the class a large one. A meeting will be held Monday evening of next week to decide on the instruction and select the style of gymnasium suits to be used. The course will consist of a lecture period on health hints, and will embrace calisthenics, breathing exercises, grace of carriage, dieting, drills, singing, poise, a number of which are under the course of instruction received in the high school.

Such a large number of applications have been received for entrance that it has been suggested that two other classes, one for children between the ages of 8 to 12 years, and one for married women, be organized. It is likely that these two classes will be effected to accommodate the large number wishing instruction.

SUMMARY OF TAXES SHOWS AN INCREASE

(Associated Press Tamed Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., April 29.—A summary of the taxes levied in Oregon for the present year on the basis of the 1925 tax rolls shows a total of \$44,575,948.19, which is about \$2,147,700 more than was levied for 1925 on the basis of the 1924 rolls. State and county taxes show some reduction, the former by about \$291,000, or \$7,200,820.79 this year against \$7,492,761.47 last year. The county levy last year was \$5,850,288.26 and this year is \$5,540,596.15. The increase over last year arises from other tax levies, which are mostly school and road taxes.
