

AMERICAN HELD ON IRISH CHARGE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) COOK, Ireland, April 30.—An American, giving his name as Patrick Garland, has been arrested on a charge of assisting in the organization and maintenance of an illegal military force and with conspiring for the overthrow of the Free State government. He was taken before District Justice Patrick O'Sullivan today for arraignment. Garland was arrested Tuesday when he arrived at Queenstown aboard the steamship Adriatic. Garland's address was given as New York City. The police said that when he was arrested a man of Republican correspondence was found concealed around his waist and that drafts on an Ulster bank for \$1,000 also was found. The prosecuting counsel regarded the arrest of the gravest importance to the Free State. He said that the documents found on the prisoner showed that negotiations were being carried on in the United States for the purchase of machine guns. The authorities say that attempts of the kind disclosed in the communications found on Garland were exceedingly dangerous and that conviction could be punishable by death. MCKENZIE PASS IS OPENED TO TRAVEL EUGENE, Ore., April 30.—Four automobiles crossed the summit of the Cascade mountains, through the McKenzie Pass yesterday, a full month earlier than last year, and a record for an early season crossing. A car driven by Hugh Winney of Eugene was driven through to Sisters. Martin Hansen of Metolola and C. N. Saranson of Sisters drove through to Eugene. W. W. McNamara of Oregon City and M. A. Reid of Eugene were in another car to make the trip over the summit. Ordinarily, travel over the pass does not begin until well into June. The crossing yesterday is the earliest on record. For the past week or more the drifts of snow have been plowed, to allow the sun to better melt the white flakes, and yesterday the last drift was shoveled aside. Stage service between Eugene and Bend will be started Sunday as a result of the opening of the pass.

GOVERNOR SHOWS MEN LENIENCY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., April 29.—Guy B. Bond, who on February 8, 1926, was sentenced to serve three months in the Lane county jail and pay a fine of \$500 for illegal transportation of liquor yesterday received a commutation from Governor Pierce who quashed the fine. He has served the jail sentence. The district attorney and the sheriff of Lane county recommended the commutation. The governor also issued a commutation to Robert McMillan of Coos county who killed a female deer and was fined \$200. Under the terms of the commutation he will pay the fine in monthly installments of \$25. The state game warden and the trial judge recommended the governor's action.
