One of the latest types of refrigerator soda fountains is being installed today at Crocker's Drug Store. The fountain, known as the Liquid Mechanical, is of the very latest style and will be a valuable addition to the equipment of the store. It provides space for 40 gallons of bulk ice cream, as compared with 9-gallon capacity of the old fountain, and also has space for brick ice cream, frozen confections and bottle goods.
