MANY TO SEEK NOMINATION AT MAY PRIMARIES

Voters to Be Faced By Long Ticket at Election on May 21.

INTEREST IN CITY

Agitation Over Sunday Closing Amendment Is Expected to Bring Out Large Vote.

In spite of the nearness of the primary election and despite the stimulus of frequent visits by aspiring candidates, interest in the May election has so far failed to develop to any marked degree. In Roseburg, where the election is complicated by a vote on a civic issue, the proposed amendment to the charter to close motion picture shows on Sunday, there is a better prospect of a large vote than elsewhere.

It is probable, however, that as the election date comes nearer the voters will show more interest, and it is hoped that there will be a good attendance at the polls on the 21st.

Voters of both parties are to be faced by a rather lengthy ticket, particularly as regards the state officers.

For the office of national committeeman republican voters will find only the name of Ralph E. Williams of Portland, but democrats will be required to vote on candidates Will R. King, Milton A. Miller and Oswald West all of Portland.

For United States senator the republican ballot resembles a state directory. Eight candidates constitute the imposing array of applicants for that important office. They are Rose E. Barrett of Warrenton, Alfred E. Clark of Portland, James J. Connelley of Portland, Clarence F. Every of Washington county, L. B. Sandblast of Portland, A. R. Shumway of Umatilla county, Robert N. Stanfield of Portland and Frederick Steiwer of Umatilla county. The democratic ballot has two candidates for U. S. senator, Bert E. Haney and Elton Watkins, both residents of Portland.

Hawley Unopposed
W. C. Hawley is unopposed for the republican nomination for Congressman from the first district, and the democrats have brought forth no applicant.

The race for governor promises to be one of much interest with William A. Carter of Portland, I. L. Patterson of Polk county and Jay E. Upson of Deschutes county constituting the republican nominees while Walter M. Pierce present incumbent and Louis Palmer Weber of Portland wave the banner of democracy in their appeal to the voters.

Four republican candidates seek the nomination for justice of the supreme court with three to elect. These candidates are Henry J. Bean of Umatilla county, George M. Brown of Douglas county, Thomas A. McBride of Columbia county and George S. Shepherd of Multnomah county. The democrats have no candidates out for this office.

Superintendent of public instruction is another office which affords the voters a wide latitude for selection, for the republicans offer five applicants and the democrats two.

Roseburg Woman Running
The republican ballot carries the name of Rosa B. Parrott of Roseburg, W. C. Alderson of Multnomah county, Mrs. Emma Bryant, Washington county, Charles A. Howard, Coos county, and Fred J. Tonne of Marion county. On the democratic ballot appear the names of J. O. McClatchie of Benton county and R. R. Turner of Polk county.

C. H. Gramin, Salem, republican and C. A. Von Schrittz, Portland, democrat, are unopposed for their respective party nominations for labor commissioner.

Thomas K. Campbell, of Portland, republican, and Clyde T. Spooner, of Portland, democrat, are nominees of their respective parties for public service commissioner.

Three for Representative
Three well known Douglas county men are seeking party nominations for representative from Douglas county. R. L. Gille, of Roseburg and B. F. Nichols of Riddle are the republican nominees with two to elect. Walter S. Fisher, present incumbent, is the democratic candidate.

For the office of county commissioner there are also three candidates, A. W. Caswell of Myrtle Creek and John O. Lyttal of Glendale, republicans and Huron W. (Continued on page three.)

PHILAGENTS IN PHILADELPHIA HIT

U. S. APPLES TO BE CROWDED OFF BRITISH MARKET

LONDON, May 1.—The "apple a day" maxim is to be tried out on the members of the Australian cricket team during their stay in England. The Australian authorities here have arranged for a daily supply of apples for the cricketers, who have eaten at least one every day aboard ship coming over.

An Australian apple armada is on the high seas bound for England. Forty great steamers, loaded with choice fresh fruit from the Antipodes make up the formidable fleet, which in a few weeks will lay down a barrage of apples on England that even the doughty Drake of Spanish armada fame could not repel. The cricket team is not expected to devour all the fruit.

The overseas dominion has joined with government officials here in a concentrated cooperative movement to create a great new market for fresh fruit in the United Kingdom. With American and Canadian apples somewhat in disfavor because some of them are said to have arrived in England with arsenic spray still on them, the Australians have decided that now is the time to bid strongly for the trade of the mother country. An attempt will be made to educate the public to ask for Australian fruit.

WHEAT REPORTED AS HEADING OUT
PENDLETON, Ore., May 1.—Federal wheat on the nursery farm of Elmer McCormack is reported to be heading out at this time, the earliest in history of the nursery that wheat has headed out. It is ten days earlier than usual.

SIX BALLOONS ARE STILL IN THE AIR

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., May 1.—All of the five contesting balloons which are known to have landed as well as the "Skyark" pilot balloon exceed the American record of 205 miles for balloons in the fourth category which includes those of 35,000 cubic feet capacity, filled with hydrogen.

The Akron N. A. A. made 580 miles; United States Army 821, 560 miles; U. S. Army 819, 475 miles; Good-year Southern California 435 miles.

The leader "Skyark" set a new record for the second category.

Six balloons were still in the air late today.

The exact distance of the "Detroit Advertiser," which landed in Laurence county, Kentucky, is not known.

COL. MITCHELL IN ROSEBURG TODAY ON WAY NORTH

Col. William A. Mitchell, formerly of the U. S. Air service, who recently attained national-wide prominence by his attack on the service, is to be a visitor in Roseburg this afternoon. He was a speaker at Grants Pass today, where he was the guest of the Cavemen. A large delegation of the Grants Pass hospitality club accompanied the officer northward from that city to Roseburg, where he takes the northbound train at 3:50 p. m. today for Portland. At Roseburg he is to be welcomed by a group of the members of the Officers Reserve Corps and the American Legion Post.

MAY DAY QUIET WITH ONLY FEW STRIKES CALLED

Portland Strike Fails to Materialize When Workers Vote Against Plan.

STRIKE IN ENGLAND

Coal Industry Affected As Million Workers Quit—Troops Moved to Quiet Disorders.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—The threatened strike of various building trades unions, scheduled for today was virtually averted and only a small number of structural and re-inforcing steel workers left work this morning.

Five hundred building laborers last night voted almost unanimously to remain on their jobs and submit their demand for a wage increase to a board of conciliation provided that the contractors were willing to leave the question to that body.

The holsting engineers also agreed to leave their similar demand to the board. The roofers also postponed their threatened strike after the contractors requested time to reach an agreement.

All four unions had demanded an increase of a dollar a day threatening to strike unless their demand was granted.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 1.—Lumber among Vancouver shipyard workers announced that a mass meeting last night that a strike will be called May 7 if demands for wages increases are not met. Shipwrights, carpenters and boat builders are paid \$6 a day and caulkers \$6.75. The former demanded \$6.50 and the latter asked \$7.50.

LONDON, May 1.—A stoppage of work in the great coal industry of the British Isles, affecting 1,120,000 workers, was in effect today.

There was a strike and also a lockout, due to the cessation at midnight of the government subsidy and failure by the mine owners and miners to settle their dispute as to wages and hours.

A general strike in support of the coal miners has been declared for next Tuesday. Employees in vital services will be called out, allowing only distribution of essential foodstuffs.

All the collieries were idle today, but many would have been closed anyhow, for May day is observed as a holiday in some areas.

Miners of the night shift in Levens certain pits this morning followed the example set yesterday by the day shift toilers and brought their tools up from the mines.

While the number of persons employed in all branches of the coal industry is shown by the latest available statistics to be around 1,120,000, many have been out of work some time through depression in the industry.

It is asserted that in some quarters that the miners lack sufficient money to meet the requirements of a prolonged strike, their funds having been depleted by unemployment pay to members of the union for months past. The trades union congress, however, has immense resources.

The possibility of a cessation in mining has been long in prospect that some industries will not be immediately cut short of supplies. The gas, electric and other utility services have been storing coal for some time.

The government has been preparing for the possibility of a future emergency and has perfected elaborate arrangements to meet the public needs for food and other necessities.

More than 220,000 private and commercial vehicles with their drivers are ready for distribution services.

Many of them were called today to the places assigned to them.

The authorities are credited with having confidence that even if there is a general strike their measures are sufficient to insure that the public shall not suffer from lack of food or other immediate requirements.

The government today proclaimed that "a state of emergency exists" in consequence of the coal strike. It thus assumes power granted by the throne, to employ troops or take any other measures necessary to maintain order and insure the welfare of the population.

Tincher Credit Bill and Pending Cooperative Marketing Bill Is Favored by Secretary Jardine

POMONA, Fla., May 1.—The Tincher credit bill and the pending cooperative marketing bill were endorsed by Secretary Jardine in an address today before the annual conference of the farmers' union. He also favored recognition through higher prices for quality production of cotton.

Expressing the opinion that the Tincher bill, one of the three divergent surplus crops proposals pending in the house "will pave the way for a better stabilization of prices than farmers have ever enjoyed before," the secretary said, "It opens up the opportunity to check most of the gluts and fluctuations which upset the markets so disastrously. It will put resources in the hands of farmers such as have long been at the disposal of other business groups. It is not subsidy or charity. It represents powerful and businesslike aid applied at the point of the agricultural system, where it can be most effective—that is, at the marketing end."

"I see little hope for any permanent solution of the surplus problem in subsidies, or dumping programs. Even if we could set up some such artificial expedient, the community at large would soon tear it down."

COL. MITCHELL IS INITIATED BY WILD CAVEMEN

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 1.—Colonel William Mitchell, formerly of the United States army air service, ate raw meat and "drank the blood of a dinosaur" here today as part of the rites of being initiated as a caveman.

Cavemen in full costume—the costume consisting of raiment of hairy skins and horns took Colonel Mitchell off a train at Hornbrook, Calif., early today and rushed him by automobile to this city. Surrounded by forty members of the Cavemen, Colonel Mitchell pledged himself as a member of the order. He also posed for pictures clad as a Caveman.

After a luncheon in his honor by the Cavemen and the American Legion, Colonel Mitchell was taken by automobile to Roseburg, where he was placed aboard the train.

The Cavemen comprise a community organization taking its name from the Oregon Caves, near Grants Pass.

SEVENTEEN FIRES IN B. C. FORESTS

NELSON, B. C., May 1.—Seventeen forest fires were reported in southeast British Columbia last night. The latest blaze started today near Bonington, B. C., and raged uncontrolled.

TO FORM NEW SAVING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION

Local Investors to Incorporate With Capital Stock of \$250,000.

WILL FILE SOON

Corporation Papers to Be Forwarded to Salem First of Week—Officers Chosen.

A new incorporation, the Douglas Saving and Loan Association is being formed in this city, the final papers being in course of preparation today. The incorporation papers will be forwarded to the corporation commission at Salem the first of the week, according to present plans, and the new organization will be perfected the first of next week.

The incorporators are F. H. Churchill, B. W. Strong, A. L. Durham, C. A. Lockwood, George Kohlhaugen, J. E. McClintock, Wayne Jones and B. L. Eddy. The capital stock will be \$250,000.

The association is being formed for the purpose of selling stock, receiving deposits and making loans to members. Its activities will be confined to city and rural property in Douglas county, and it is proposed to include the entire county in the transactions in which the association will engage.

The incorporation has a strong financial backing, and with a capital stock of \$250,000 will be able to start its work on a large scale.

So far no organization has been perfected, only the preliminary work leading to final incorporation having been undertaken. The tentative plan, however, is to organize with B. L. Eddy as president; George Kohlhaugen, vice-president; J. E. McClintock, secretary and B. W. Strong, treasurer. The directors will be F. H. Churchill, A. L. Durham, C. A. Lockwood, George Kohlhaugen, J. E. McClintock and B. L. Eddy. Wayne Jones will serve as manager of the association.

The incorporation will be governed by the state laws, which are quite complete in their provisions regulating the activities of such companies.

BREAKS WORLD RECORD

LINCOLN, Neb., May 1.—Roland Locke, fleet Nebraska, broke the world's record here today, running the 220-yard dash in 29.5 seconds. A brisk breeze aided the runner, and it appeared doubtful if the mark would be allowed. Five A. A. E. officials timed the Nebraska flash in today's race.

HEAD OF BOOTLEG RING IS SENTENCED

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—William A. Smith, charged by the government with being the head of a bootleg ring was sentenced today in federal court to a year and a day in prison. He was already under sentence of six months in jail and fine of \$1,000 in connection with the Max Hall liquor conspiracy case. F. R. James and E. W. Harris, accused of being associated with Smith in liquor operations, were sentenced to 90 days each. Mrs. Helen M. Smith was paroled.

The charges against Smith involved in the case disposed of today were preferred following his arrest in Columbia county while he was at liberty before beginning his six months jail sentence.

INDIAN TEMPLE MOUND BIG FIND

NEW ORLEANS, La., May 1.—Henry B. Collins, Jr., a representative of the Smithsonian Institution who returned here yesterday from Plaquemine parish, about 40 miles below New Orleans, reported the discovery of the largest known temple mound of the Chickasaw Indians. A federal appropriation to further excavation of historic mounds will be asked soon, he said.

Mr. Collins attached special importance to his find because bones he discovered were in almost perfect condition which is unusual in the south. He left here to make a survey of the mound south of western Louisiana where the Chickasaw and the cannibalistic Atlatpa Indians lived before the arrival of "pale face" pioneers.

Mr. Collins said that virtually nothing is known of the Chickasaw and Atlatpa civilizations. The bones found are believed by Mr. Collins to be between 50 and 1,000 years old, antedating the discovery of America by Columbus.

The temple mound of the village he visited rises about fifty feet above the muddy flats of the marshes. It is surrounded by a number of smaller mounds.

O. A. C. ROOKS DEFEAT ORE. FROSH

EUGENE, Ore., May 1.—The O. A. C. basketball team from O. A. C. had little difficulty in defeating the University of Oregon Frosh here yesterday afternoon, 19 to 7.

The first five innings it looked like a ball game, with the O. A. C. and a flock of A. C. hits and almost many Oregon errors in the next inning put the O. A. C. in the lead.

The Oregon youngsters made 12 errors, while the Aggie bates were pulling but one bobble. The visitors gathered 16 hits to 3 for the local youngsters.

SAYS HARRY WILLS ONLY CHALLENGER

NEW YORK, May 1.—Harry Wills is Jack Dempsey's only challenger and any attempt by Tex Rickard to displace Wills with another opponent for Dempsey will result in a fight with heavyweight champion being declared ineligible in this state, said James A. Farley, chairman of the New York Athletic commission today.

FREIGHT RATE ON LIME ROCK LOWERED

SALEM, Ore., May 1.—The Public Service commission today authorized a reduction in the freight rate on lime rock from the Willamette to Salem from \$2.50 to \$2.05 a ton. This rate will be applicable only to lime rock shipped from the quarry in Josephine county to the state penitentiary plant in Salem in car lots of 90,000 minimum to be manufactured into lime for agricultural purposes.

In addition to the reduced rate on the raw product the commission has authorized the application of the special low rate on agricultural lime from Salem based on the scale of rates used out of Gold Hill before removal of the lime plant from that place to the penitentiary.

RADIO PHOTOS ARE USED COMMERCIALY

NEW YORK, May 1.—The first commercial photographs sent across the ocean by radio were published in three morning newspapers here today.

Weathering a storm enroute, the first picture was sent from London to New York last night in one hour and forty-five minutes. Later pictures came through in 42 minutes.

A commercial picture service to be maintained by the Radio Corporation of America and the Marconi Wireless company of England, was inaugurated with last night's transmission of the photographs.

WELL KNOWN MAN IN PORTLAND FINED

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—A. G. Clark manager of the Stock Exchange building, pleaded guilty today before District Judge Hawkins to possession of a pint of liquor and was fined \$100. He denied knowledge of liquor in the Stock Exchange building.

BIG OIL RESERVOIR SAID TOTAL LOSS

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., May 1.—Standard Oil company officials declared today that the big reservoir containing 296,000 barrels of oil and its contents are a total loss. The value of the oil is estimated at \$500,000.

The great tank of oil which was fired by lightning Thursday is still burning today, though the oil is mostly consumed and all danger is past.

HIGHWAY TO FRESNO IS NOW PASSABLE

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., May 1.—Road gangs working at a furious pace since storms of Thursday evening washed out county highways, have made the state highway to Fresno passable. It is open to traffic. The Taft highway has been rendered passable, through the construction of one detour.

Road gangs are repairing the woody road which is now open for most of its length.

The main line of the Southern Pacific railroad was open. The Porterville branch between Delano and Famoso will be opened today.

ANOTHER GANG MURDER OCCURS IN WINDY CITY

Body Found in Alley Where It Had Been Thrown From Taxi.

FIND A NEW CLEW

Young Hardware Dealer in "Valley Quarter" Knows Name of Men Who Purchased Machine Guns.

CHICAGO, May 1.—The body of a man known as Martin Garrity, slain while riding in a taxicab with three other men, was found early today several hours after the crime had been reported by the car driver.

The driver told the police he was hailed by four men about midnight and told to drive to the southwest section of the city. After he had driven for two hours, a shot rang out in the back of the cab.

He was ordered to pull up to an alley where a body was thrown out. The other three forced him to drive several blocks away before they left the taxi.

Alex K. Korecek, young hardware dealer of "the valley" quarter, has become a center figure in the police investigation of the slaying of William McGinnis, an assistant state's attorney.

Although fearful of paying with his life for any information he may give on gang and alcohol warfare, Korecek has admitted to the police that he knows the names of purchasers of three Thompson machine guns. Previously he maintained he had sold only one such weapon to unknown buyers.
