FRANCO-SPANISH WAR AGAINST THE RIFTS TO RESUME

Peace Conference Fails As Tribesmen Decline to Accept Conditions Laid Down.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) OULDA, French Morocco, May 6.—The peace conference between the Rifians and the Franco-Spanish delegates broke down today. The Rifian delegates, who returned today from consulting Abd-el-Krim, their chief, told the conference they would not maintain their previous attitude. Thereupon General Simon, chief delegate and chairman of the conference, declared the negotiations at an end.

French military headquarters has been established at Taza, and operations will begin as soon as the conditions along the present front permit.

The peace conference between delegates of Spain and France and Abd-el-Krim, the Rifian leader, which was terminated unsuccessfully today, was the latest effort to bring peace to Morocco, which has been torn by more or less constant fighting by deserting tribesmen for many years. The conference was opened unofficially at Oulda early in April and after a lengthy exchange of terms between the French and Spanish and Krim, was opened officially on April 26.

The discussions, however, did not last long and finally Krim was given until midnight on May 6 to accept or reject the terms. The main points at issue were the surrender of prisoners, the ending of Krim, the submission by the Rifians to the authority of the Sultan, and permission for the French and Spanish troops to take advanced positions within the terms of the parity were put into effect. Disarming of the tribesmen also was another condition.

Morocco, by the treaties of 1911 and 1912, was placed under the protectorates of Spain and France, Spain being given the northern section along the Mediterranean and France the southern portion. The French zone had been fairly quiet until last year but the Spanish zone was subject to frequent disorders, especially since 1921, when Krim took up arms. Emboldened by considerable success

EX-DRY OFFICER IS FOUND GUILTY AT SECOND TRIAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—J. J. Snodgrass, alias J. J. Carey, alias Jackson Streetor, former special dry enforcement officer in southern Oregon, was found guilty in federal court today on charges of obtaining an automobile by representing himself to be a federal officer.

It was the second trial of Snodgrass on charges brought through Mrs. Blanche L. Meeker of Medford. The jury in the first trial last winter disagreed.

Attorneys for Snodgrass obtained ten days in which to file a motion for a new trial.

He is held in jail under a five-year warrant, which charges that he is an escapee from the St. Cloud, Minn., reformatory.

Jury Tampering Charged. Charges of tampering with a juror in the Smith-Christensen liquor conspiracy case, directed against Paul Bradshaw, alleged dry law violator, resulted in another trial today, after being tossed back and forth between federal court and federal grand jury several times.

OREGON U. HIRES ZOOLOGY TEACHER

EUGENE, Ore., May 6.—Dr. Arthur Russell Moore has been selected as head of the zoology department at the University of Oregon. Dr. Moore is now professor of general psychology at Rutgers College, New Brunswick, N. J.

Dr. Moore will take the place of Dr. Harry B. Torrey, who left last year. Harry B. Yocum, assistant professor of zoology, who was acting as chairman of that department this year, will remain a member of the department, and will teach the same classes next year that he taught this year.

Dr. Moore received his A. B. degree from the University of Nebraska in 1904 and his Ph. D. from California in 1911. He was assistant professor of psychology at California in 1911. He was assize when he went to Bryn Mawr as associate professor. He has been professor of general psychology since 1916.
