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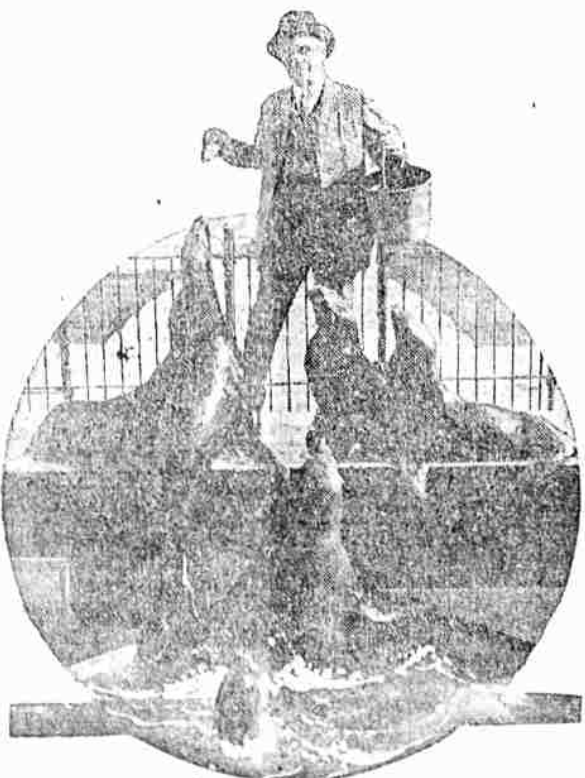

JUDGE ENGLISH CASE IS POSTPONED

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The impeachment trial of Federal Judge English of Illinois, was postponed today by the senate until November 16.

The \$165,000,000 public buildings bill was passed today by the senate without a record vote. It now goes to conference.

A bill to authorize a building program for army aviation to provide 2,200 new airplanes at the end of five years, was passed today by the house and sent to the senate. It also would provide for a limited number of small airships and free and captive balloons. Cost of the program has been placed at about \$175,000,000.

Rates on livestock in the region between the Missouri river and the interstate commerce commission-Pacific coast have been found by the Interstate Commerce Commission to be not unreasonable and complaints by the American National Livestock association and others have been ordered dismissed.

DEADLOCK UNBROKEN IN STRIKE OF FISHERMEN

ASTORIA, Ore., May 5.—Still not fishermen who are on strike demanding 14¢ a pound for salmon caught, were still out today. The packers, who offer 13¢ a pound, were making no move to end the strike. The run of salmon in the Columbia river so far has been very light and in view of this the packers seem anxious to break the deadlock, as there is a big small loss to either side. An increased run would bring the controversy to a head it was said. Fish traps and seines which are not involved in the strike were being slightly improved catches today in the Astoria district.
