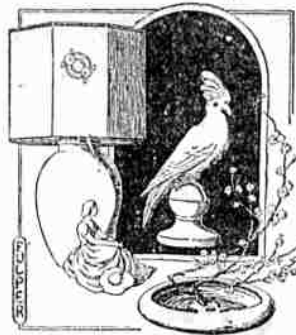

BANFIELD MINES ARE LEASED TO SPOKANE FIRM

The pending and leasing of the Banfield mine, situated on Drow Creek in the southern part of Douglas county, W. B. Dehl and associates of Spokane, was announced today by the owner of the property, Charles C. Banfield of Portland.

The Spokane firm will commence work at once and will install a 100-ton daily capacity concentrating plant of the latest type, after putting the road in shape, and will also erect a sawmill for cutting lumber for the various buildings and shaping mine timbers. The ore is to be shipped to Tacoma smelters for the final treatment. The mine is already past the prospecting stage, many tons of ore having already been developed, and it has the appearance of being one of the finest mining properties in Southern Oregon.

The property was owned by the late Henry Banfield, a mining engineer, who died on the claim in 1922. The mine has been idle for several years, but will soon take on new life, with a large force of men at work opening up the property for stopping and drifting.

The ore bodies in this mine bear the same characteristics as the mines in Eastern Oregon, the ore lying in porphyry, while the walls are dolomite and dolomite. The course of trend is northwest and southeast.

Some of the ore taken from the mine can be shipped direct to the smelter as there is considerable high grade ore, 18 to 23 per cent copper assaying \$60 to \$80 per ton, while the low grade will run from 4 to 6 per cent copper at \$1.50 to \$3.00 in gold. The low grade ore will be treated at the mine. The average is \$12 per ton, and the concentration is 8 to 1. The character of the ore is chalcopyrite and bornite. The ore bodies are 20 to 30 feet wide and are in well defined ledges. There is about 4,000 feet of development work completed such as tunnels and drifts.

J. L. Magney, E. M., of Spokane, Washington, examined the property in the fall of 1925 and made a very favorable report showing good assay and tonnage.

The mine was discovered in the late eighties by a south Umpqua Indian and came into the possession of the late Henry Banfield in 1901. He continued its development until the time of his death in 1922.

JOKER FOUND IN CALIFORNIA ALIEN LAND LAW

LOS ANGELES, May 6.—The California anti-alien land law prohibits the leasing of farm lands by a corporation controlled by persons ineligible to American citizenship. The same law prohibits ownership by aliens as individuals.

An exception, however, is made in the matter of corporations controlled by American citizens, and where a majority of the stock is held by them. This opinion was handed down last week by Attorney-General U. S. Webb in a matter brought from Colusa county.

The opinion does not specify how much of a margin there must be in the majority ownership. It states that "individual aliens may own stock in such corporations, the law not applying to such corporations."

This opinion, it is believed, opens the way long sought by various shipping concerns who have believed it a good business policy to have these moving fruits and vegetables more cheaply identified with the shipping organization. In the case of the Imperial Valley cantaloupe deal a few local leases on lands usually through the organization of the shipping organization. When these leases expired they could not be renewed, hence the shipping organizations were compelled to lease the lands direct, enabling the growers to share the crops. This, in turn, called for heavier investments on the part of the shippers, who were already carrying a heavy load.

A liberal construction of Attorney-General Webb's recent opinion would indicate that Japanese and Chinese growers who have demonstrated their ability will now be able to secure a share of the rewards. A company of which 60 per cent of the stock is owned by Americans could sell to such growers 40 per cent of its stock and in this manner, be enabled to hold such growers from season to season to the advantage of all concerned.

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Firm Could Lease Land

If a corporation has the right to buy farm lands, it likewise would have the right to lease lands, so that through conservative management and a strict compliance with the opinion, a corporation with 40 per cent aliens would be privileged to lease without getting near the danger line.

It was Japanese and Chinese growers who did the pioneering in the development of the cantaloupe,

cauliflower, lettuce and other industries. A few have managed to hold on, but recently many have become interested in the Mexican proposition. They can lease and also own lands in Mexico without restriction. Several leaders have made large investments. In Mexican land during the past year, with a view to selling off smaller plots to fellow countrymen, who in turn would supply these leaders with products for their packing houses.

Attorneys who have represented Japanese and Chinese clients have always contended that, if their clients were permitted to own stocks and bonds of American corporations, as well as owning corporations doing a mercantile or manufacturing business, they should likewise have the right to own as well as to lease lands. The

anti-alien land law, however, put a final bar to this.

Attorney-General Webb's opinion would, it seems, point the way for such aliens to legally acquire lands, not as individuals but as minority stockholders of corporations. In this manner such aliens would be protected against any discrimination, since the corporation laws are impartial for the protection of all stockholders. As there is no limit to the size of a corporation or its capital stock one of \$10,000,000, or even \$100,000,000 capital may be organized and operated clearly within the law, offering aliens the opportunity they have long desired for a permanent investment in the way of lands.
