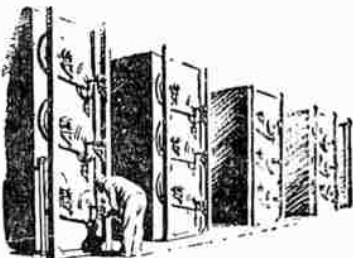
TWO 15-YEAR-OLD BOYS SENTENCED FOR THEFT

TROOPS ARE CALLED OUT BY RIOTING

the mental tasks which many of them performed with such signal resource during the war, and filled days of idleness at selling newspapers from motor lorries.

One of these is the Duchess of Sutherland, who is driving a lorry for the Times and the Evening Standard and selling issues to passers by.

Among other society women similarly employed are the Duchess of Westminster; Viscountess Massereene and Ferrard, who is a noted society beauty; Lady Maureen Stanley, daughter of the Marquess of Londonderry; Mrs. James Carrigan.

Most of them are members of the women's legion, who were motor drivers during the war. With a membership of seven hundred they are keeping seventy-five lorries at the disposal of the ministry of transport, the hospitals and the newspapers.

Wider Strike Threatens.

Fresh anxiety was caused among the public by reports of increasing sentiment among trade unionists in favor of calling out the electrical and gas supply workers. This would not only affect lighting but all electrical services, because of the refrigeration and other vital services.

The trades union congress considered the matter at length today but no decision had been announced up to five o'clock this afternoon.

The electrical and gas supplies are among the vital services which the government is empowered to maintain under the emergency proclamation.

Electrical workers have not been authorized to go on strike. It was said tonight by representatives of the trades union congress. Strikes of electrical workers which have occurred in several factories are unauthorized and have only partly impeded services because volunteers immediately were engaged.

Peace Outlook Brighter.

LONDON, May 7.—The guarded prediction was made this morning by influential labor quarters that the strike crisis might be settled early next week.

This is the most optimistic expression thus far emanating from a high source. It is based on the fact that the government has not divulged unofficial peace-making are steadily working for a solution, and the pressure of the churches and other bodies as well as prominent individuals is being brought to bear to end the trouble.

It is understood that President Baldwin and J. H. Thomas, chief of the labor leaders, were closeted a late hour last night but what took place is unknown, although it is assumed they were discussing the crisis.

Officially both the trades union congress and the government are standing pat and both claim things

are going well in their respective camps.

Traffic Gets Better.

The government at noon today stated that conditions were improving throughout the country with only minor disturbances. Traffic conditions were easier, with many more trains and other transportation facilities available.

The British public entered upon the fourth day of the general strike with the same outward appearance of stolidism as on the previous days. The people had in prospect better transportation facilities and they also were heartened by the fact that there would be more newspapers published. Otherwise the outlook did not seem in any way improved.

Glasgow Scenes Worst.

If the strike continues, the irresponsible sections of the public probably will become more troublesome as the days pass. There have been numerous disturbances already. The worst trouble has occurred at Glasgow, which has a notoriously radical population, especially in the adjoining shipbuilding and mining districts. There was fierce rioting in the east side of the city yesterday when the police broke many heads and themselves suffered a bombardment of stones and other missiles. The constabulary got the upper hand. Sixty-six persons were arrested. There was some looting.

Edinburgh and some of the big English towns also witnessed lively scenes, while in southeast London tumult kept the police busy a long time. The rioting in no case was on such a large scale as to compel the police to call for the aid of troops. The strike leaders continue to depreciate violence, and the disturbances apparently have been due to bad elements over which they have no control.

The vote of the seamen union on striking has not been concluded. It is known that some of the seamen are ready to strike, but the union itself refuses to countenance any premature action.

Double Motive Claimed.

The British Gazette calls attention to the fact that the British workers' bulletin is being produced by union printers and argues that this shows the strike is against newspapers whose political views the strikers disapprove, and not for industrial purposes. "The only printers who are allowed to earn their living at their own trade are those employed to foment the strike," says the British Gazette, which is the government organ.

London's special constables are taking a shate in police duty. It is claimed that \$,000 of those who served during the war have been rolled and that there have been 3,000 new enlistments.

Partly because the electrical trades union is restricting the supply of electricity in the east end of London, the directors of the London hospital have closed the department for outside patients.

The strike has cut off the supply of clean, crisp new bank of England notes, which the British public was accustomed to obtain from banks. Dilapidated or dirty currency is never issued in normal times, but the banks have been instructed to put them in circulation again.

Outside Aid Promised.

The miners' executive committee met in the House of Commons committee room last night and arranged for a big series of propaganda meetings throughout the country during the week-end. About forty members of parliament will address the meetings.

The trades union congress has received promises of support from comrades in South Africa and Australia. The South African trades union congress, it is asserted, will call upon its members to prevent the exportation of commodities to Great Britain which might prove detrimental to the strikers. The Australian railway men have cabled offers of assistance.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, May 7.—The executive committee of the Danish trade unions gave the Association of Employers preliminary notice today of a strike in support of the British strikers.

Liner Is Tied Up.

NEW YORK, May 7.—The burden of maintaining ocean traffic between the United States and Great Britain and fallen upon the shoulders of shipping men in New York, with news that the English

"You know this strike was not called under the ordinary rules or regulations," he said, and several voices called out "It was. This is a strike in defense of the working classes."

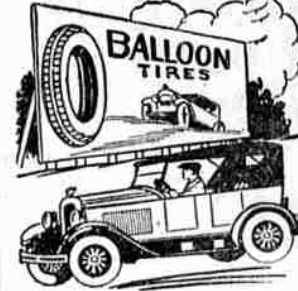
