PACIFIC U. HEAD DEFENDS OUSTING OF TWO STUDENTS

(Associated Press Special Wire.) FOREST GROVE, Ore., May 7.—Expulsion from Pacific university of Virgil Lilly and Webster Wertz in connection with the publication of "The Influence of Sex" in the university paper, was upheld by Dr. John P. Dobbs, president. Dr. Dobbs faced the publication of the article, which was suppressed after some 500 copies of the paper had been printed, and declared that it was against the ideals of the institution. Dr. Dobbs declared that the men would have but little chance for reinstatement in the university.

Yellow posters on which were printed the article were distributed about the campus yesterday, but efforts of the faculty to trace the parties responsible were in vain.

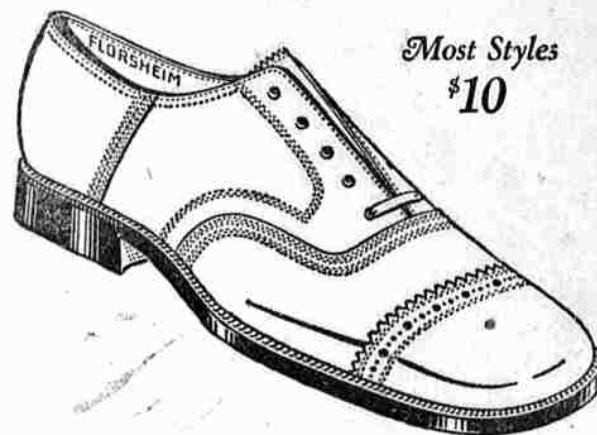
