U. S. FORCES LAND  
AT NICARAGUA TO  
GUARD AMERICANS

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, May 8.—Government cavalry is reported to have routed the revolutionists at Agua Agria. The first federal army is approaching Rama (inland from Bluefields) and a battle is in prospect for tomorrow or Monday.

United States marines have been landed at Bluefields to protect American lives and property, as a result of the capture of the town by liberal revolutionists.

The Nicaraguan government is watching all ports to guard against the importation of arms from Mexico to assist the revolutionists.

KLAMATH JUSTICE  
COURT RECORD SHY  
SOME OF ITS PAGES

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 8.—Mutilation of Justice Court records covering a portion of the term of E. X. Kendall, former acting Justice of the Peace and now a deputy sheriff here, is noted in a report filed with the county court by the Robinson-Nowell company, official county auditors.

No suggestions or conclusions are given in the report, which states simply that eight pages have been torn from the docket and that times collected in the cases covered by the missing docket pages were not turned in to the county treasury until a period of more than two months had elapsed.

Minor discrepancies in the books of two other justices in the county were noted in the report.

COUNTY HAS BIG  
SUM AT STAKE  
IN TAX MEASURE

of the great states. If the bill passes congress and the county realizes the sum which Assessor Calkins has found to be due, taxpayers of the county will find a great reduction in their future tax levies. The sum will be sufficient to take care of the construction of a new court house, and to retire a large share of the county's outstanding road bonds, while the addition of almost 15 per cent to the taxable land of the county will serve to reduce the levy by a like rate.

## Special Funds to Benefit

Not only will the county's general fund be benefited, but there will be a large sum for distribution to various special funds. The distribution of the money is shown by the following table which is a summary of the extension made by Assessor Calkins:

truck load. Fancy New Oregon also brought \$3.50 generally.

There were some berries delivered at \$2.75 and \$3.00 this morning that were contracted for yesterday morning.

Continued showers during the past 24 hours has seriously hampered picking and delayed the ripening of the fruit. Growers say they will have lots of strawberries with a day or two of warm sunshine. New Oregon and Marshalls will be on next week with favorable weather.

There was the usual Saturday rush for berry supplies both by the wholesalers and retailers. Offerings did not last long even at the extreme values.

A large portion of the berry crop produced around Portland is being diverted into shipping channels. There is a brisk outside demand from Seattle and Tacoma and some of the jobbing firms worked until eleven o'clock last night, loading out cars.

Goose berries are plentiful but the price is holding well at seven cents. There were no raspberries available on the early market.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 8.—The local egg market is generally steady although values ranged lower on the exchange. Previous gains were wiped out when extras dropped back to 27 cents and current receipts to 24 1/2. Receipts yesterday were 2408 cases, with 901 cases put into storage.

Butter continues slow and weak in the local market with both storage and stocks along the street accumulating. Most of the trade look for lower levels soon. On the exchange, cube firsts are off a half at 36 1/2 cents. All other grades are unchanged.

Country dressed veal closed weak and lower with 15 cents the general top on choice light calves. Good calves sold down to 14 cents Friday. Hog receipts were light during the week and prices held firm at 18 to 18 1/2 cents on choice light stuff.

Light broilers glatted the market again this week. Receipts were not so unusually heavy but the demand was entirely lacking for the small stuff and dealers had to cut prices to keep stocks moving. Bids for light broilers are down to 20 and 22 cents and the dealers are not eager for them even at that level. All other kinds of poultry were in brisk demand and prices were firm throughout the week.

Heavy hams quoted at 27 to 28 cents and light hams at 26 cents. Heavy springs, two pounds and over, 26 to 28 cents with Ribs and Ribs up to 30 and 32 cents.
