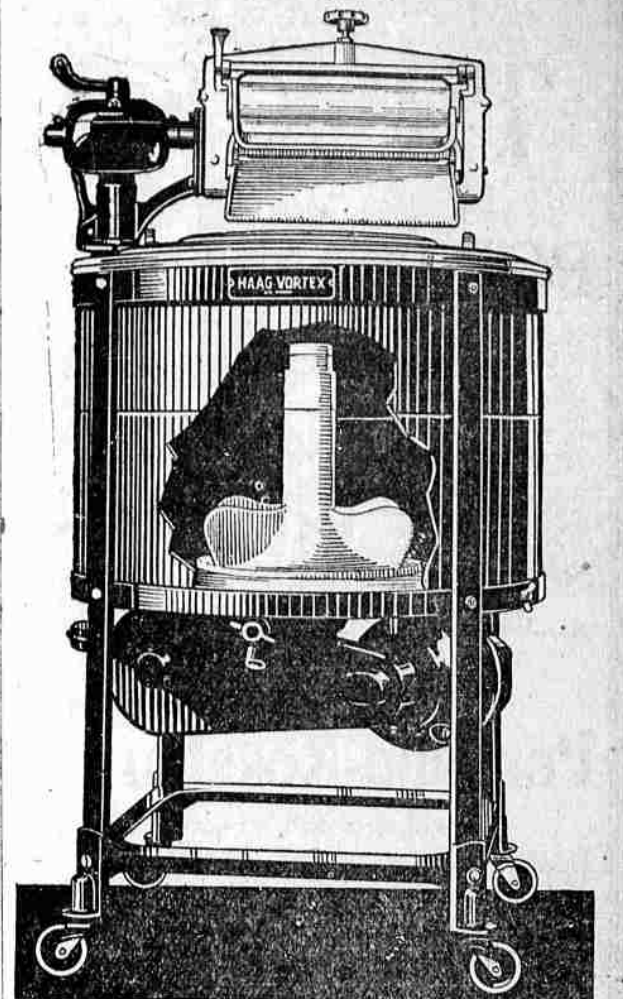

LEGION SUES TO FORCE BONUS FOR TRAINING CORPS

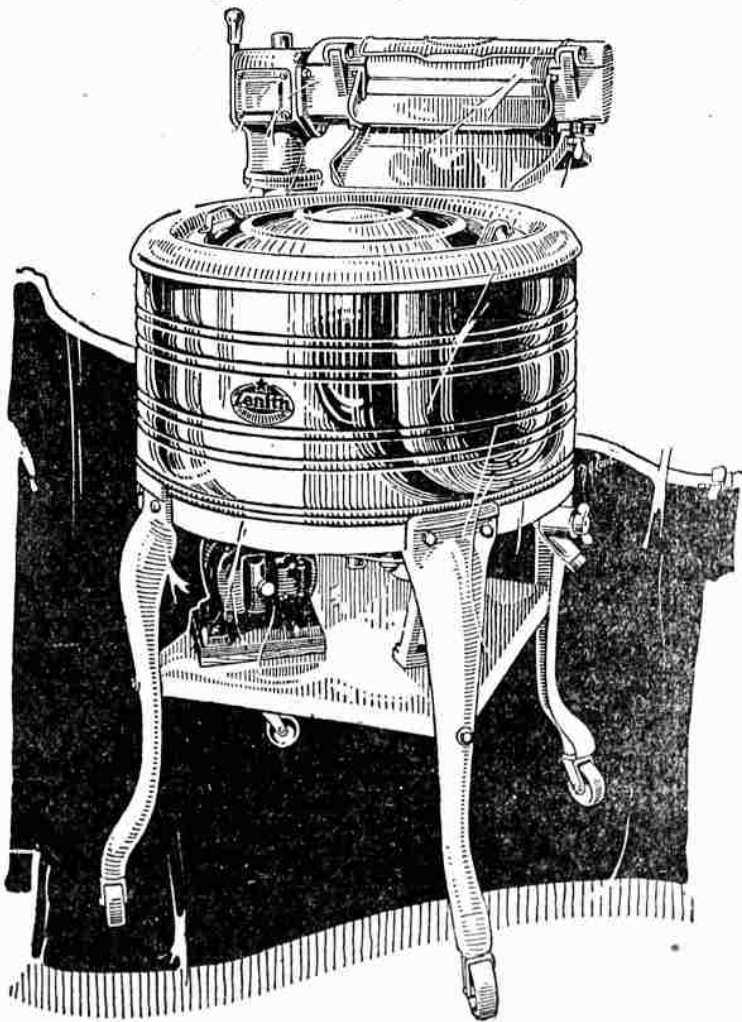
SALEM, Ore., May 10.—It is estimated that 1,000 men in Oregon who served in the Student Army Training Corps during the World war will be affected by a mandamus proceeding to be filed in the supreme court today by the state department of the American Legion to force the state bonus and loan commission to pay bonuses and loans to corps members. The state constitution specifies that the benefits of the act shall be available to all members of the army, navy and marine corps of the United States who served in the war. The war department has held that student army training corps members were members of the army of the United States. An act of the Oregon legislature however, specifies that members of the corps shall not participate in the benefits of the bonus and loan act. The contention is that the constitution rather than the legislative act should be upheld.
