WM. BOGARD, PIONEER OF CO. DIES SATURDAY

Chapel Filled With Host of
Sorrowing Friends at
Services This
Afternoon.

The death of Wm. W. Bogard, one of Douglas county's oldest pioneers, and a resident of the Glide vicinity for over eighteen years, occurring late Saturday afternoon, came as a great shock to his many friends in Roseburg and Douglas county. Death came at 3:30 o'clock, after four weeks of illness, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ed Wright, in this city.

Mr. Bogard, who was a member of a well known pioneer family of this county, was born December 20, 1859 at Marysville, California, and came to Oregon with his parents in 1866. The family settled in Driver valley, Douglas county, residing there for many years. On July, 1886, Mr. Bogard was married to Mary Harness, and the couple made their home near Oakland, where seven children were born to the union. They moved to Glide eighteen years ago, since that time making their home in that vicinity.

A man of sterling character and high ideals, Mr. Bogard devoted a great deal of time to work in the Baptist church, of which he was for many years a member.

Mr. Bogard and his family always maintained a hospitality in their home, for which they were noted in the Glide district, and travelers and visitors were always assured a welcome at any time.

Surviving are a widow and six children, Wm. A. of Roseburg; Loyal D. and Vaughn A., of Bremerton, Washington; Mrs. Clarence Fraser, of Sutherlin; Mrs. Ed Wright and Mrs. Baxter Davis, of Roseburg. He leaves two sisters, Mrs. Mary Bonebrake, of San Francisco, and Mrs. George Carlyle, of Oakland, Oregon; and two brothers, V. L. Bogard of Beaverton and Joe Bogard of John Day. Four grandchildren also survive.

The funeral services were held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Roseburg Undertaking Chapel, which was filled to capacity with sorrowing friends, gathered from all over the county. The Glide school was dismissed today and the entire community attended the services. The eulogy was read by Rev. Mulholland. Beautiful floral offerings, a last tribute to his memory, blanketed the casket. The body was laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery.

fair, however, and willing to investigate, and after hearing the claims, and going over the real facts, the opposition vanished, and those who were most openly against the bill at first, developed in favor of it before the hearings were concluded. The committee in both houses are very favorable. They have brought up numerous questions regarding the amount of relief to be afforded and the form that it is to take, but I am confident that some satisfactory system will be worked out.

Remembrance Expected.
"We may not receive all that we are asking for. On the other hand the bill may be passed without amendment and we may receive every cent provided for by the measure in its present form."

"Personally, I had an opportunity to talk with many of the leaders in congress regarding the situation. I found them without exception to be interested and favorable. They asked direct, pointed questions, questions designed to go to the very bottom of the proposition and determine the actual existing facts. We were fortunate in the fact that we had ample information on hand showing all the past actions of the government, the courts and other agencies, so that the actual status of the grant lands at present, together with the losses which the country have sustained through loss of taxes, was quickly presentable."

Precedents Cited.
"We found congressional very interested in precedents. In matters of this kind attention was called to money paid Indians for timber lands, and upon advances or reclamation areas, showing an absolute precedent in payments of claims identical in issue with those advanced by Oregon. The equity of the claims were frankly admitted, and with precedents established for payment of such claims congress has a foundation upon which to consider the present measure."

"The reports of the committees will place the bills on the calendar in the senate and house. The bills may be called up a number of times (possibly ten), through the unanimous consent of the members of the respective houses, and it is possible that action may be obtained during the present session."

Oregon Delegation Strong.
"I found the Oregon delegation in congress to be highly thoughtful among all the congressmen with whom I talked. Senator Stanford is one of the leaders in the senate. His personality has made him a friend of practically every member, while he is recognized as a strong worker for any just measure. Senator McNary is outstanding for his legal ability and his words regarding the land status of any measure are accepted as

FRENCH ROYALISTS AND POLICE CLASH; 268 ARE INJURED

(Associated Press London Wire.)
PARIS, May 10.—There was fierce fighting in two sections of Paris yesterday when royalists and the police clashed. The royalists marched to two statues of Joan of Arc to lay wreaths. The casualties were 118 policemen and about 150 royalists injured.

When the police began to use their clubs on the steps of the church blessed and shouted "Down with the Republic!" The police finally cleared the church steps, but not without vicious protests. The other clash occurred in Place St. Augustine.

Notwithstanding the strong forces of police which had been mobilized to prevent the royalists from disobeying an order of Minister of the Interior Durand against formal processions to the monuments, they forced their way through police cordons, fighting

with walking canes against night sticks, and played the floral offerings at the statue. In from the historic church St. Roch in the Rue St. Honoré there was a lively clash in view of the congregation. The royalists sang, "Long Live the King; Down with the Republic."

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—Extremes ruled in the early berry market both in prices and quality. Receipts were liberal, buyers were anxious for supply. Prices ranged all the way from \$2.50 to \$3.50 per crate with a choice lot bringing \$3.75. Quality ranged from small, dirty to green Oregon Dollars, to firm large Improved Oregon. Oregon were in the greatest demand and offerings readily cleared up at \$2.50 a crate. The top of the gold dollars went to \$2.50 to \$3.00.

The old hop market continues firm at 28 cents with about 15 sales changing hands over a week end at that level. Contingent market is also firmer with bids for 1926 crop and to 21 to 22 cents for a year of crops. Less than 2,000 bush of old crop hops remain in growers hands.
