other points with friends.

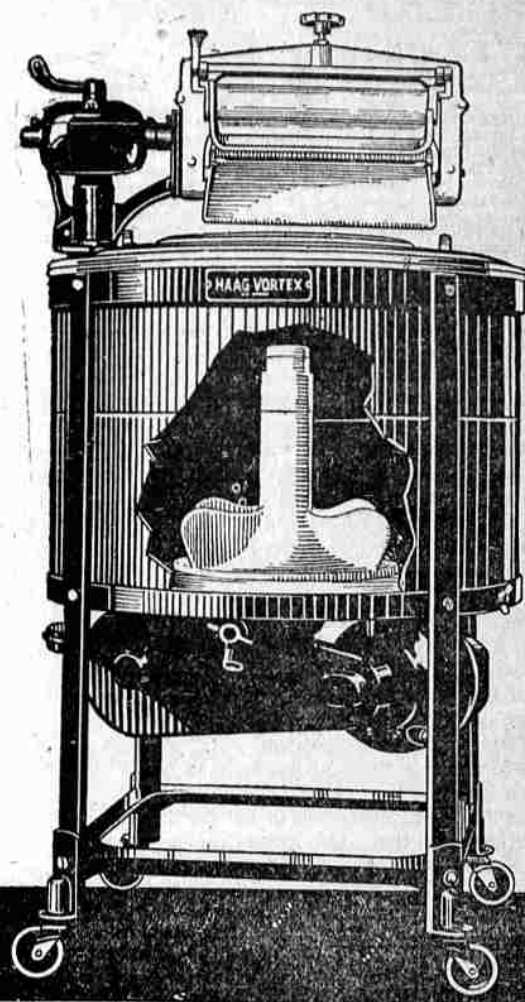
### Former Roseburg Boys Visit—

six miles an hour, and only one  
passenger was injured.

Four deaths from railway ac-  
cidents have occurred in the last 24  
hours. Three passengers were  
killed and a number hurt when a  
train manned by volunteers colli-  
ded with a freight train near Edin-  
burgh and in another accident at  
Cambridge one person was killed  
and two were injured.

King George held a privy council  
at Buckingham Palace this morn-  
ing. Whether it was for ratifica-  
tion of further emergency mea-  
sures was not disclosed.

Main Strike Body Firm.  
A government spokesman, out-  
lining the situation at the begin-  
ning of the eighth day of the  
strike, said there had been impor-  
tant defections among the railway

men, but that the main body of  
strikers remained out.

Much interest is being displayed  
in the activities of the various in-  
ter-union leaders and especially in a con-  
ference of these men sched-  
uled for tomorrow, at which it is  
reported a formula for ending the  
trouble will be discussed.

Notwithstanding the govern-  
ment's action in commandeering  
the newspaper supply, both in the  
hands of publishers, the Daily Mail  
brought out its first London edi-  
tion this morning.

Sir John Simon's declaration  
that the strike is illegal is declar-  
ed by the government spokesman  
to have caused many trade union-  
ists to return to work uncondi-  
tionally.
