EMPLOYERS OF BRITAIN STIR UP FRESH FUSS

Quit Unions or Don't Come Back to Work, Is Edict to the Strikers.

MEN REFUSE TO OBEY

Result Is That Conditions Are Not Much Improved—Unions Will Not Give Up Rights.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, May 13.—Great Britain's nine-day general strike called off yesterday, switched today to what labor regarded as a widespread lockout by the employers against union men seeking to return to work on the old status.

This development came as one of the most dramatic of all those in the disturbed days since the industrial upheaval began. What it amounted to, according to labor unions, was a disposition on the part of the employers to smash union influences as far as possible.

Throughout the country unions and employers were deadlocked—the unions demanding unqualified reinstatement of the strikers and the employers declining to deal with them except on their own terms.

Miners Not Weakened. "The Trades Union Congress made a fatal mistake in calling off the general strike," Secretary A. J. Cook of the miners' federation, told the Associated Press today.

LONDON, May 13.—The Trades Unions have no alternative but to resist to the utmost "any attempt to impose humiliating terms on the workers."

Strike Far From Over. LONDON, May 13.—Great Britain's general strike theoretically is over, but practically is still continuing to function this morning more or less as it had for the last nine days.

Little Improvement Seen. Comments were heard today that it was far easier to start a general strike than to halt one.

Even in London volunteers continued to man the comparatively few buses running, hardly any tram cars were functioning, and the subway service was about the (Continued on page eight.)

at Ovation Finale of Long Air Trip

MANILA, May 13.—Two of the Spanish aviators, Captains Loriga and Gallarza, who started from Madrid thirty-eight days ago to fly to the Philippines, ended their 11,000 mile journey today when they brought the only remaining plane of the three that left Spain to rest at Camp Nichols, American army flying field, three miles from Manila.

Wherever the aviators went the crowds attempted to kiss them and carried them upon their shoulders.

They entered the Catholic Cathedral upon the shoulders of the crowd, a number of Spanish priests assisting in the welcome. The crowd was so dense in the cathedral, one girl died of the heat.

Whether the aviators will attempt to fly back to Spain or return by steamer depends upon orders from Madrid.

COSTUME PRIZES TO BE FEATURE OF THE CARNIVAL

A contestant may wear the same costume in the parades each day, and consequently has a chance to win first prize in the same class.

Historical costumes must represent some particularly historical personage, or must represent some historical year or group such as cavemen, pioneer, Quaker, Minute Man, etc.

The costumes are also to appear in the parade on Saturday night, and persons not appearing in the parade are urged to be costumed and masked on Saturday night.

All entries in the costume contest must register at headquarters, giving their name and class of entry by Tuesday, May 18th.

POLISH REVOLT CAUSE PUZZLES OUTSIDE WORLD

Ex-President Pilsudski Enters Warsaw, But Not to Seize Office.

GRIEVANCE MYSTERY

Many Reported Killed in Street Battle—News Censorship Blocks Information.

PARIS, May 13.—The veil of mystery hung over the situation in Poland yesterday. Behind it momentous events were believed to be in progress, centering about the famous figure of former President Marshal Pilsudski, who is at the head of a revolt which has made it necessary for the government to take precautionary measures to defend the city of Warsaw.

Whether Marshal Pilsudski is leader in the revolt to install himself as dictator or is merely injecting a military operation into the political situation to bring the left parties back into office is not yet clear.

Rebels Enter Warsaw. The Havas Agency quotes a dispatch received by the Ceteka Agency in Prague yesterday, to the effect that Pilsudski's armed forces were allowed to enter Warsaw without opposition.

OREGON U. DEAN REQUESTED TO QUIT; REFUSES

Colin V. Dymnt, Denied Hearing By Regents, Holds Position.

CASE 4 MONTHS OLD

Action of Board Cabled to Him While Abroad; Later Absence Leave Made "Continuous."

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

J. W. Hamilton, chairman of the Board of Regents of the University of Oregon, this afternoon declined to comment upon the refusal of Dean Dymnt to resign from the faculty. He admitted that the board of regents after full consideration had come to the conclusion that it was not necessary to retain Dean Dymnt, and had given him notice to that effect.

Resignation of Professor Colin V. Dymnt, dean of the college of literature, science and the arts in the University of Oregon, has been requested and refused.

Dean Dymnt received notice of the action about the middle of March, while he was at Florence, Italy. He had been granted a year's leave of absence, and was traveling with his wife in Europe. He declined to resign, and called the board of regents, demanding a hearing of any charges against him.

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
