Dean Dymond occupied a prominent position in the University organization for several years, up to a time shortly before he took leave of absence for a year and left for Europe. His first position in the organization was in the school of journalism, but he progressed steadily, and finally was elected dean of the college of literature, science and the arts, a position generally regarded as the most important of any in the organization, says that of the president, and at one time he was prominently mentioned as a potentiality for the executive position.

His wife, Dr. Bertha Stuart Dymond, also holds a position on the university faculty, in the department of physical education. She took a year's leave of absence at the same time her husband did.

Alleged Cause of Trouble. Two Portland members of the Board of Regents of the University of Oregon were absent from the city today and no official explanation could be obtained locally for the request for Dean Dymond's resignation.

From persons close to the university, however, the Portland Telegram says it is understood that Dean Dymond had largely alienated support of his colleagues because of his alleged inability or refusal to cooperate and his reputed inability to confine his activities strictly to the management of his department.

same as yesterday. The authorities predicted that things would begin to right themselves forthwith, although it would take considerable time before conditions approached anything like normal.

Miners Stand Firm. As far as the miners are concerned their strike against lower wages and longer hours continues and nothing is expected to develop before their national meeting of delegates here tomorrow.

Much agitation was shown at Trades Union Congress headquarters this morning on account of the men not returning to work and it was admitted the situation was serious though not alarming.

Employers Blamed. A Trades Union Congress spokesman told the Associated Press: "The situation confronting the country just at this time is not brought about so much by unwillingness of the men to return to work as by the obstinate, defiant attitude of the employers who in so many instances, according to our reports this morning, have refused point blank to take them back."

Sir William Joynton-Hicks, the home secretary, broadcast a message saying: "The government feels sure that all the employers who have been assisting in meeting the requirements of the emergency by voluntary labor will recognize the great civic service these men performed and will desire to deal generously with them."

It is suggested that employers dispensing without notice with the services of any paid voluntary workers should follow the practice which the government proposes to pursue, and grant a gratuity of at least ten days pay.

Union Split Probable. There is a feeling in labor circles that the happenings since the calling off of the general strike may cause a split between the Trades Union Congress and the miners, and that when the miners' delegates meet in Kingsway Hall tomorrow, it will be another "black Friday" similar to that in 1921 when the railway and transport workers agreed to back the miners, but the rail men suddenly withdrew.

At the moment the feeling is that the position is serious enough for the general council of the T. U. C. to convene an extra special session at which the T. U. C. may be compelled to take control of the situation again and ask the government to explain its policy. Union officials say the employers are insisting that the strikers sign on as new men and forego many benefits. They declare this cannot be allowed.

Lord Rending, former viceroy of India, may be chosen neutral chairman of the suggested advisory committee for reorganization of the mining industry.

Strike Over Renewed. LONDON, May 12.—(Special to the Review.)—The T. U. C. asserted that in view of the difficulties surrounding the reinstatement of strikers, the executives of three of the railway unions have called upon all railway men to continue the strike until they receive satisfactory assurances from their employers.

The Transport and General Workers' Union also instructed its members to remain on strike until further orders.

Unions Like Rock. LONDON, May 12.—(Special to the Review.)—The T. U. C. on the strike situation, former Premier Ramsay MacDonald, the government labor leader, said that more men were out today than yesterday. This was because the employers had proposed terms that would make it impossible for the mining industry to accept them.

Mr. MacDonald said that if any attempts were made to smash the union, "if any section or toolish person in the country that after the strike and yesterday's action, thought that he could say the faces of trade unionists in the past," he was "very much interested."
