PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO HAUGEN BILL IS KILLED

WASHINGTON, May 14.—By a vote of 40 to 65 the house today rejected an amendment to eliminate the price maintenance feature of the Haugen farm relief bill. The amendment was offered by Representative Black, democrat, Texas. It would have stricken out a section proposing a plan to maintain the price of every basic commodity at the world market quotation plus the import tariff. The price stabilization section of the bill was approved today by the house.
