they resist all development. Unless bureaucracy is constantly resisted it breaks down representative government and overwhelms democracy. It is the one element in our institutions that sets up the pretense of having authority over everybody and being responsible to nobody.

State Integrity Urged

"The states should not be induced by coercion or by favor to surrender the management of their own affairs. The federal government ought to resist the tendency to be loaded up with duties which the states should perform. It does not follow that because something ought to be done the national government ought to do it. But on the other hand, when the great body of public opinion of the nation requires action the states ought to understand that unless they are responsive to such sentiment the national authority will be compelled to intervene."

Historic Event Honored

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., May 15.—This college town, once capital of the old dominion, today revived the spirit of some of the scenes of 150 years ago for the celebration of the sesqui-centennial anniversary of the signing of the Virginia independence resolutions.

To give fitting recognition to the act of these colonial legislators, the first official step taken for freedom from Great Britain, historic streets and buildings were restored as nearly as possible to their early appearance as a setting for participation in the day's ceremonies by President Coolidge, Governor Byrd, Senators Glass and Swanson and other high federal and state officials.

The occasion was the first since December to draw the President from Washington to make an address. Many members of congress left their desks to tread the famous Duke of Gloucester street and visit the old capitol and other scenes touched with the memory of the men who dared to instruct their delegates to the continental congress to work for independence.

The senate and house, in recognition of the event, both had adjourned for the day, while troops from Fort Eustis had been designated by the secretary of war to act as the President's escort.

STRIBLING GIVES
15 POUNDS WEIGHT
AND BEATS RISKO

Slashing Attacks Too Much for Bigger Man—Bout With Berlenbach Comes Next.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

NEW YORK, May 15.—The state of Georgia, which already boasts one newly crowned pugilistic champion in the negro middleweight titleholder, Tiger Flowers, today had a potential light heavyweight king in W. L. (Young) Stribling.

Last night at Madison Square Garden Stribling yielded a fifteen and one half pound to Johnny Risko of Cleveland and then vanquished the conqueror of Paul Berlenbach with a dazzling attack which twice had Risko groggy.

Risko stood up gamely for the ten rounds, but only in the last two did he make any impression on the Georgian's defense. The award of the judges to Stribling was favorably received, and the smiling victor was greeted by "Ma" and his young bride with hugs and kisses as he climbed from the ring.

Stribling will meet the light heavyweight champion, Berlenbach, on June 19, for the title.

Stribling won seven rounds, his advantage in the fifth and seventh being pronounced. Smashing rights to the jaw had Risko groggy in these sessions.

Stribling weighed 174½; Risko 190.

Herbie Stribling, younger brother of William L., trounced Joe Werner of New York in a six-round preliminary. Herbie, a lightweight, floored his opponent twice in the fifth round.

NEW YORK, May 14.—Johnny

Risko, of Cleveland, will have an advantage of fourteen and one half pounds over Young Stribling in their ten round match at Madison Square Garden tonight. Risko scaled 189 and Stribling 174½ at the official weighing-in.

EUGENE THEATRES

LEASED 10 YEARS

FOR HALF MILLION

EUGENE, Ore., May 15.—Lease of the McDonald and Rex Theatres of this city for a ten year period at a consideration of \$500,000 to the Universal Film corporation was announced here today. The film corporation will control and operate the theatres directly, beginning June 1.

Donald McDonald has been manager

of the two theatres. The lease agreement carries a clause providing for the renewal for five years at the option of the leasing company. If the option is exercised, the consideration will thereby be brought to \$800,000 for the full term. The theatrical deal is the largest ever made in Oregon outside of Portland.

SPAIN THREATENS
