Two Schools Are Tied For Track Meet

He is to be weighed again by the judges and if he is found to be over the weight prescribed for the division in which he entered his scores will be rejected, which will advance Rose and Benson schools and lower Fullerton to third place. At present Benson and Fullerton are each allowed 35 points and Rose 75. In the event that the contest is upheld Benson will have 91 points, Rose 78 and Fullerton 72.
