Peary, after repeated explorations in the Arctic region, in which he encountered great hardships and suffering, succeeded in reaching the North Pole, and now again this spirit of adventure is repeated in Lieutenant Commander Byrd and Pilot Lloyd Bennett, and the Amundsen-Ellsworth trans-polar expedition, who have flown at great hazard over these wild and desolate territories, finally reaching the Pole, where storm and peril await the daring explorer. It is man's determination that not one square mile of the earth's surface shall be left unconquered and unexplored. LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

SHALL THE MOVIES CLOSE ON SUNDAY?
(Letter No. 6 by a Roseburg Citizen.)

The people of Corvallis and Eugene are well satisfied with Sunday closing of the movies. This appears by the fact that each time the matter comes up the majority for Sunday closing is larger than before. Five years ago the majority in Corvallis for closing was about 80 votes. This year the majority in favor of continuing the closing policy was 287. There has been a similar experience in Eugene. The people of those cities must be presumed to have intelligence equal to that of the people of Roseburg, and yet if they have lost their "liberty", they do not seem to know it.

There is a very ancient writing that reads like this: "Woe unto them that call evil good and good evil; that put darkness for light, light for darkness; that put bitter for sweet and sweet for bitter."

High authority pronounces America the most lawless nation in the world. A great school of lawlessness and crime is the moving picture. The picture producer claims that the public has a perverted taste, which demands pictures that are morally offensive. The truth is, they are educating the young to have a perverted taste. They are commercializing not only a great amusement, but they are commercializing human weakness. They proceed after the manner of the fisherman who "baits" the hole, and whets the appetite of the fish, and makes the appetite the means of luring and landing the fish. Sunday is a very old institution and should be used in a better way. There are many better ways. Going to church is one of them. But no man or woman is compelled anywhere to go to church, though Sunday laws are general.

Last Saturday night, millions of hand and brain workers in the United States were glad that they could lay down their tasks for a Sunday rest. Everywhere labor on the farm, in the shop, in the store, in the office, ceased until Monday morning. Of course a few kids another day, but in America the majority must rule, and the majority require a Sunday rest. A small minority may make a lot of noise, but they must not expect to rule the majority. Great numbers of those who thankfully laid down their work last Saturday night may not have looked forward to going to church the next day, but they looked forward to a day of reading, or recreation in the out-of-doors. Every movement to commercialize amusement and the Sunday rest is a movement towards the secularization of Sunday and its reduction to the level of every other day, and will eventually mean, for the laborer, a seven-day week of toil.

No man can lawfully get a shave in an Oregon barber shop on Sunday, because the law requires barber shops to close on that day. But a moving picture house can on Sunday show boys and girls, as well as older people, pictures that leave blots upon their souls. We do not hear much complaint that men have lost their liberty, because they cannot get shaved on Sunday. Slaving a man is a very innocent thing, even on Sunday, as compared with a great deal that appears upon the screen. What great tragedy the state of Oregon has exercised in passing a Sunday barber law! Strange that some lovers of liberty can stay in good old, prosperous Oregon. The supreme court of the state has held that this law, making it a misdemeanor to do barbering on Sunday, does not deprive anyone of liberty or property contrary to the Constitution of the United States, and that it does not encroach on the equal rights guaranteed by the constitution of the State of Oregon. The Supreme Court of the United States has made similar rulings. But a course poor benighted jurists and statesmen who have enacted and sustained Sunday legislation during all our national life did not have the benefit of the "wisdom" of those Roseburg prophets who appear so anxious to see their names in print.

And again, what oppressive tyranny it is that under the laws of the State of Oregon, no court of justice can be opened, and no civil process of any court can be served on Sunday. What a burlesque shame that if a promissory note falls due on Sunday, it is not legally due till the next day! How can liberty-loving souls live under such a despotism as we have in Oregon?

Do these Sunday laws unite church and state in Oregon? They do not, as can be shown by the decisions of the highest courts. Such questions have had the deepest study of learned and patriotic men of the highest character, men of more genuine patriotism and love for true liberty than whole nations, and for the purpose of the difference between license and liberty, and who have no conception of the functions of government, and no true understanding of history.

The poet Longfellow sings of Sunday:
"Oh day of rest! How beautiful, how fair,
How welcome to the weary and the old!"

No sweeter scene has been pictured in literature than that shown by the poet Robert Burns in "The Cotter's Saturday Night." The poet chose for the scene a child November night, the beasts retreating from the plow, the toll-worn Cotter going home, and the same shall be held as a guaranty of the faithful performance of the contract. BEAUTY CHATS

THE MIDDLE-AGED FIGURE

Surplus flesh creeps over the body insidiously and so slowly that it is almost impossible to tell that the slender lines which mean youth have gone until you suddenly awake to the fact that you have a middle-aged figure. Clothes are so loose fitting now that this dress may be worn three seasons and still seem right, though during this time you may have gained 25 pounds, and all the lines of your figure changed and aged in consequence. Few women wear corsets nowadays, and those that do wear elastic girdles which give easily to the figure that the waist may spread several inches without the woman being aware of it.

Watch your figure, and if you are getting stout take measure to stop it at once. Take the measurements of the bust, waist, hips, upper arm (just at the arm pit) and the calf of the leg. Remember them, jot them down if you are apt to forget, and if you are not already so slender as you want to be, begin reducing at once. If you thing you are getting fat measure yourself from time to time and never allow those measurements to increase over a quarter of an inch.

As to the means of reducing, you must decide that for your self. You can go about it scientifically, making a careful study of the caloric values of foods, limiting yourself to a certain number of calories every day. This is an excellent way and is absolutely sure once you have found the number of calories which you can

allow yourself. It is the only way for a woman who has gotten very much overweight.
But if your figure is merely lumpy and middle-aged, which is a more easily repaired tragedy, you can choose less drastic methods of reducing. Your friends will probably tell you any number of them. And you should exercise as well.

Florence C.—For the blackheads apply hot, damp rags to open the pores and soften the impact. Massage then with a cleansing cream to further soften and dissolve the soil in the pores. Scrub with hot water and soap, or remove the soiled cream, rinse till all soap is gone and then close the pores again with very cold applications of water.

It takes constant care and many such treatments before the skin is free from blackheads. When there is such a condition the pores are distended, so they must be improved to keep more impacts from forming.
Myrtle.—You did not state what caused the scars so I cannot advise except in a general way. If these blemishes resulted from pimples, they will bleach off in time if you keep your skin freed from eruptions. Sometimes a blotchy condition appears if the digestion is imperfect, or if there is poor circulation.
Of course, powder cannot help any more than to act as coating for a very short time, and to get rid of the blemishes you must cure yourself of the cause for

Answer: Perhaps one of our Column writers will happen to have this recipe and will write it on a postal and send to me, for publication?
L.: "I have been given a feather bed which has a nasty odor. Can I wash it successfully and how?"
Answer: Feather pillows are very successfully washed, but a feather bed is so large that it must first be made into small bags or pillows before being washed. To get feather from one tick to another, rip about six or eight inches of the seam in one end of each tick, baste edges together, then shake the feathers from the full tick into the empty tick. In this way, feathers are not scattered. To Wash

Feather Pillows. Roll 15 minutes in a boilerful of water softened with Never use soap or soda on feather one-third cup of borax and one tablespoon of household ammonia, pillows. Lift the pillows out of the boiler with a stick, lay them on the washboard, and scrub the tick with a stiff brush dipped in heavy soda (if the tick is soiled). Rinse in two waters, squeeze as dry as possible, shake vigorously and pin on your clothesline in a shady spot. Shake from time to time, and hang up by new corners. Do not leave out after the dew falls. Three or four days may be required to dry them thoroughly.

Inform: "Please tell me how the new small grapejuice glasses are used—when and with what else?"

Or, at a guest dinner they may be used (filled with grapejuice) beside the American table. Diet and Health

YOU DON'T KNOW HOW TO CARE FOR YOUR TEETH!

There is an article in the February 1926 issue of the Journal of the Outdoor Life, written by Dr. William J. Gardner, a specialist in dental and mouth hygiene. I'll confess that until I read this article I never before really knew how to care for my teeth.

I considered this article one of the best contributions to mouth hygiene that I have ever read, and I'm going to give you a resume of it. I hope you will realize its importance sufficiently to cut the article out (or else get the magazine yourself) and put it into service. I'm going to quote from the article, on toothbrushes, dentifrices, mouth washes and dental floss, because there is so little I can omit and it is so concise that it is difficult to work over.

Toothbrush
"The toothbrush is the most important factor in mouth cleanliness. For civilized man it affords a means of bringing about the same cleansing action on the teeth and the same stimulating action on the gums that raw and coarse food did for primitive man."
"Most of the toothbrushes on the market are too large for efficient brushing. The use of a small, fairly stiff brush is to be encouraged. The working end should be about seven rows of bristles long (about one and one-quarter inches), and two or three

Care of the Teeth
"If a brush is to do good work it must receive a certain amount of care. A few simple rules will lengthen its life and maintain its efficiency."
"Place a new brush in a strong cold salt solution for two hours before using."
"Never use hot water on the brush. It softens the bristles, alters the shape of the handle and makes it unsuited for efficient brushing in a short time."
"After using, rinse well, shake out all the water, possibly, and hang it in the sunlight to dry. It is more convenient to keep it in a glass tumbler, always keep the bristles end out of the glass."
