MOTION PREJUDICE IS OVERRULED BY JUDGE HAMILTON

Application For New Trial
Judge in Muetzel Case
Is Denied—Hear-
ing Monday

An affidavit of prejudice
against Judge Hamilton was heard
in the Circuit Court today in the
case of the State of Oregon
against Otto Muetzel. The ap-
plication was denied, after coun-
sel on both sides had been heard,
and Judge Hamilton will preside
over the trial of the case.

A technical question was in-
volved which may result in the
matter being taken to the Su-
preme court for a ruling.

Mr. Muetzel was arrested two
years ago for possession of liquor
and was tried in the justice court
and convicted, an appeal being
taken to the Circuit. The grand
jury later indicted him for hav-
ing a mash in his possession, a
charge of which he was acquitted.
The case appealed was not heard
last term, but was continued un-
til the May term of this year, and
will be taken up next Monday.

Attorney Albert Abraham for
the defense, in the justice court
and in the appeal to the circuit
court, raised the question of the
admission of the confiscated
liquor as evidence. It was claim-
ed that the liquor was illegally
seized, as it was not mentioned
in the search warrant, and that
consequently it should not be
used as evidence against the de-
fendant. The court, however,
overruled this claim.

The defense then came forward
with a motion for a change of
judges, claiming prejudice on the
part of Judge Hamilton, on the
grounds that this question would
be raised again in the trial and
that as he had already ruled upon
it that he would be prejudiced
against the plaintiff's contention
at this trial.

Attorney Gordon cited the law
showing that after a judge has
once ruled upon any question in
a case, no matter how trivial the
question may be, that the defense
is barred from claiming prejudice
as the trial of that cause has al-
ready been begun.

The defense on the other hand
claimed that the application for
suppression of evidence was not
a part of the case, but that it was
an entirely separate matter being
the exercise of the right of any
citizen to recover property ille-
gally seized.

The court, however, decided
that the matter had been made
an issue in the case and that
having once been considered, was
a part of the trial and that an
