ASSOCIATION OF GREETERS WILL BE FORMED SOON

Chamber of Commerce Taking Step to Extend City's Hospitality.

PLANS COMPLETED

Napoleon Rice to Be General Chairman of Association—To Form Five Committees.

A greeters association having as its purpose the welcoming of tourists and newcomers has been authorized by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce and has been declared by the directors of the organization to be the most important work confronting the city of Roseburg. There has for some time been a growing sentiment that the city is lacking in hospitality and is consequently losing out in securing new settlers from among the tourists seeking homes in this locality.

The matter of forming an association was recently proposed to the Chamber of Commerce by N. Rice, ex-mayor of this city, and one of the leading real estate dealers. The directors were impressed with the idea and instructed the secretary to prepare plans for the greeters' association and his plan of organization has now been completed and has been approved by the directors.

It is proposed to form an organization composed of 100 members. This will be subdivided into five committees.

Merchants Will Aid.
The first committee will be among the merchants and will be headed by H. C. Darby. It will make up of all business men, particularly those having stores fronting on the highway. The obligations will be to see that every tourist or non-resident motorist who stops in front of the place of business of any merchant is given a welcome and invited to remain in Roseburg and visit points of interest nearby. The merchants will be kept advised on road conditions and will be able to direct interested persons to camping spots, hunting and fishing sections and

also them regarding their recreational program.

The second committee is a touring committee, of which J. R. Farington is chairman. This committee will be composed of 15 members whose duties will be to hold themselves in readiness with automobiles to take out newcomers or prospective settlers. These members will be called upon whenever automobiles are needed. This committee will function particularly in showing prospective settlers the agricultural sections of the county. Persons desiring to make a home in the county will be taken out by members of the touring committee to see sections devoted to the type of farming or fruit growing in which they may be interested. The committee will make no attempt to sell any property, but will merely endeavor to satisfy the desire of the prospect regarding the resources of the county.

Another committee will be the women's committee, Mrs. Washington Hughes being appointed chairman. This committee will have 25 or 30 members whose duty it will be to supply flowers for two trains daily.

Visit Camp Grounds.
The fourth committee is the camp ground committee, which has C. S. Helms as chairman. There will be 42 members who will visit the camp grounds daily and become acquainted with tourists and vacation seekers, distributing literature giving advice and information concerning recreational sites, urging the visitors to travel the byways and present invitations to remain over for a visit to points of interest.

The fifth committee is a land advisory committee with Guy Cordeau as chairman. This committee has five members who will advise prospective settlers regarding the value of lands, possibilities of productivity of various types of soils. Any person planning on buying a home in the county may have the help of this committee in an advisory capacity, assuring that they will obtain reliable information regarding any purchase which they may desire to make.

Because of the interest he has shown, and because of his ability in this line, N. Rice has been named general chairman and will have full charge of the carrying out of the detailed work of organizing the association.
