FOREST FIRES IN PENNSYLVANIA ARE FATAL AND COSTLY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WARREN, Pa., May 19.—Five thousand fire fighters today were making a supreme effort to bring under control the fire in the Allegheny National Forest which has taken two lives and caused \$2,000,000 damage to standing timber and other property. Conditions were said to favor the fighters, as the wind had died down and the flames were not spreading as rapidly as on Monday. The flames have already burned over about 8,000 acres of woodland in Elk and McKean counties.

The men fatally burned were wood choppers, as yet unidentified. Blinded and confused in attempting to flee the flames, it was thought they ran into the fire and perished. Four men, suffering from burns, were in a Kane hospital.

Besides the timber leveled, oil and gas well equipment and houses in the fire area have been destroyed.

SAILOR JACK WOOD AND WILCAT PETE DEFEAT THEIR MEN

MEDFORD, Ore., May 19.—In the main event of a double wrestling match here last night, Sailor Jack Wood, Grants Pass, defeated Frenchy Leavitt, Portland, when Leavitt was unable to continue after being thrown by Wood. Leavitt

gained the first fall with a toe hold. In the preliminary Wildcat Pete, of Glendale, took two straight falls from Cecil Barlick of Grants Pass.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 19.—Declaring both fighters had stalled, Referee Tom Waters last night called the bout between Benny Dotson and Frankie Lewis no contest at the end of the tenth round. The men were welter weights. Dotson claimed to have broken his hand in the fifth round.

The boxing commission in a special session this morning overruled the referee and declared the fight a draw.

COMPENSATION LAW IN OREGON BOON TO LABOR

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., May 19.—In the last eight months industrial concerns in Oregon have paid personal injury damages to workmen, based on court judgments, aggregating about \$900,000, members of the state industrial accident commission said today.

All those were concerns that are operating outside the workmen's state compensation act. The result of litigation, say members of the commission, is that many of the concerns are coming back to the compensation act, preferring state compensation for injured workmen rather than the inconvenience of litigation. The expense of furnishing witnesses for cases in court, whose salaries continue while they are off duty is said to be an important consideration with the industrial concerns.

Rejections of the compensation act are said to be lighter this year than for several years. Under the law, firms deciding to cease operating under the act must notify the commission by May 1. Rejections become effective July 1, and in the intervening two months they have the privilege of withdrawing their rejections.

WEIDOEFT TO BRING LATEST MELODIES

The modern ballroom, with its dropping of the term "dance hall" is declared to have taken on a new aspect. At the rate of progress, it bids fair to rival the cabaret in public patronage, because the ballroom of today is not strictly a dance hall for dance-hounds. Not so under the present scheme of things.

Booking extra attractions in the ballrooms is said to be creating a new following. It is drawing a family trade satisfied to sit about and watch the dancers and the extra entertainment. That it is a worthwhile departure is clearly indicated by the present road tour of Herb Wiedoeft and his celebrated orchestra from the fine Cindarella Roof ballroom in Los Angeles.

The Wiedoeft tour was inspired by a genuine demand, and the demand naturally indicates a willingness on the part of the public to pay for "names" and really first class organizations. The modern ballroom in the not so distant future may rival other forms of entertainment. The low admission scale which affords dancing, a show and much personal enjoyment is the big factor.

Herb Wiedoeft is a pretty wise showman as he does not depend upon dance music strictly as the means of an evening entertainment. His orchestra are corking soloists and carry a full bag of tricks to break the long hours of dancing. Their engagement here in Roseburg is for the one night only and dancing is from 8 p. m. until midnight at the armory.

UNIVERSITY COLLECTIONS IN ROSEBURG TERRITORY REPORTED TO BE COMPLETE

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., May 20.—(Special.)—Glenn Radabaugh, of Roseburg, chairman of one of the district committees in the student union collection campaign, has reported that work in the Roseburg territory has been completed. The drive for payment on pledges made to the student union building settled \$1239, most of which came from alumni.

The funds collected will be turned into the general basketball pavilion fund, being used, however, as a loan from the alumni holding corporation. The state was divided into districts and towns, and Radabaugh was commissioned by Romanynne Brand, general chairman, on the efficient work done in Roseburg.

FEDERAL AGENTS TAKE 18 BREWERIES

CLEVELAND, May 19.—Evidence involving eighteen of the biggest breweries in the east has been obtained by federal agents working while the grand jury investigates a beer syndicate operating from Scranton and Wilkes Barre, Pa., to most of the big cities of the country.

Gerald P. Murphy, special agent, said the government operatives were "on trail of the biggest game yet."

SALEM ORATORS IN AUTO CRASH; EDITH STARRETT BRUISED

SALEM, Ore., May 19.—Six Salem high school students on their way to debate before a Portland audience, were injured and bruised when their automobile was crowded from the Pacific highway near Woodburn at 19 o'clock this morning.

Winston Williams was knocked unconscious and left lying on the ground for nearly an hour while Clark Durham was severely cut about the eye.

Others in the party, all of whom were bruised, were Edith Starrett, Harold Tomlinson, Jack Ramage and Pauline Findley.

Durham was driving and attempted to pass a lumber truck headed north. As he sounded his horn the truck swerved to the inside of the highway, forcing the student party into the ditch.

Miss Starrett, Tomlinson and Williams comprised the affirmative debate team that defeated the Salem, Mass., team here May 7.
