Encouragement to Stumpage Land Owners in Oregon Object of Newly Prepared Reforestation Measure

A bill to make possible the growing of timber at a legitimate profit by landowners in Oregon on some of the 2,350,000 acres of stumpage land in Oregon has been tentatively drafted by the reforestation commission appointed by the last legislature to study the problem. The bill has figures based on a 4 1/2 per cent return to the timber grower on his investment, insurance, protection and taxation costs while his timber crop matures.

The present taxation on this stumpage land in Oregon is about

10 cents an acre, according to the commission's report, while the amount collected in different counties varies from 2.5 to 32 cents per acre. This makes Oregon dependent on this class of land for less than 1 per cent of its tax revenue; but the land is increasing at the rate of 130,000 acres a year and will soon present a serious problem in tax yield, according to the report.

The recommendations by the commission include establishment of a uniform annual tax on this land of 5 cents per acre, which would be

small enough to permit owners to retain their land and grow timber at a legitimate profit, while large enough to prevent the tax yields being a total loss. Many owners in sections where the taxes are much greater than this are now throwing up their titles to large amounts of this land because they are unwilling to risk the slow return investment of reforestation, the commission's report points out, thus leaving the lands a burden on the community, which is usually unwilling to spend the money necessary for reforestation.

The tentative bill also contains protection clauses to assure the timber grower that his profits will not be taken away by legislation subsequent to his reforestation investment.

The average timber crop yield per acre of the reforested land would be about \$94.50, in 60 years,

according to the commission's figures, estimating the average crop to be about 350 board feet per acre and the price about \$4.50 per thousand. The annual investment of the timber grower would be made up of a land rental based on a 4 1/2 per cent return on a valuation of \$2.35 per acre, a protection and insurance cost of 13 cents per acre a year, on which the grower is to make 4 1/2 per cent compounded, in addition to paying a 13 per cent tax on the timber yield.

The commission's report gives alternative amounts of annual tax with a yield tax smaller in proportion as the annual rate is greater. A one-cent annual tax, per acre would permit a yield of 30 per cent at the end of 60 years; a two-cent annual tax, 25.7 per cent; three cents, 21.4 per cent; four cents, 17.2 per cent; five cents, 13 per cent; six cents, 8.7 per cent; seven cents, 4.5 per cent; eight cents, .25 of one per cent.

BOY ENTERTAINERS SOON IN ROSEBURG; AIDING ORPHANAGE

OMAHA, Neb., May 20.—When Father Flanagan's Boys' Home troupe presents its novel performance in Roseburg shortly, the boys will depict the life and teachings of the homeless lads at Boys Town, 11 miles east of Omaha on the Lincoln highway, where the home is located.

The boys in the show are the outstanding youngsters of the home, those who have shown the most talent. Each year Father Flanagan chooses the best actors, singers and musicians to comprise the troupe. This year the crop of talented homeless lads are far better than those on the road in the past and there is no danger of them losing their enviable reputation of being "the greatest boys' show on earth."

Even the homeless lads who did not get to make the trip with the troupe are excited over the announced plans of the troupe going to the Pacific coast and returning to Omaha by a circuitous southwest route.

The lads in the home's print shop have just received a new intertype machine and they are preparing to publish a large issue of their monthly magazine, which they have named Father Flanagan's Boys' Home Journal.

Father Flanagan's Boys' Home troupe gives two performances daily, one at 4 p. m. for children and one at 8:15 p. m. for adults only. Admission is free. A parade will precede the afternoon performance.

Father Flanagan's Boys' Home is non-sectarian. It has cared for 1,878 boys without regard to race, color or religion.
