POWDER FACTORY EXPLOSION KILLS 31 IN GERMANY

HASSLOCH, Bavaria, May 21.—Nine persons dead, among them two women, and 31 persons in hospitals and a score more under treatment in private residences was the record of the casualties due to the explosion in a powder mill near here yesterday. Firemen and Red Cross workers are searching the wreckage for other victims.

Ninety men and women were at work when a powder-mixing drum blew up. On the first detonation, fire started and spread rapidly, enveloping powder magazines, which exploded one after another. Homes of persons in the vicinity were wrecked and doors and windows with a radius of five miles were blown in. Panic prevailed.

DEADLOCK NOT YET BROKEN IN BRITAIN

LONDON, May 21.—The miners owners today informed the government that Premier Baldwin's compromise suggestions for ending the coal tie-up would limit freedom of administration and would not increase the efficiency of the industry.

There is every indication that the deadlock in the mining situation will continue well into next week.

CRASHING PLANE TAKES TWO MEN TO THEIR DEATH

COATESVILLE, Pa., May 21.—Two men were killed when an airplane crashed into a ploughed field two miles west of here today.

The pilot of the plane was J. Harry Jones, 30. The passenger was J. Moyer, of Darby, Pa.

ANCIENT METHODS IN EUROPE HELP AMERICAN SALES

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The market for American apples and pears in northern Europe depends largely on the refusal of peasants to abandon their old fashioned methods of horticulture, says a report issued today by the Department of Agriculture.

It says, however, that the present generation of American apple growers need not fear that the European peasant will alter his ancient methods rapidly enough to take over the markets.
