TURKEY EGG LOAN HELPS BOYS CLUB OF DOUGLAS CO.

The division of agricultural education known as Boys' and Girls' Club Work, as promoted by the extension department of the Oregon Agricultural College, has been progressing nicely in Douglas county during the present year. Although it was necessary that most of the clubs be enrolled late in the school year, final reports are coming in very satisfactorily. There are now four hundred energetic boys and girls enrolled in the various projects which are open for this class of instruction, and the majority of these enthusiastic club members have succeeded in devising ways and means by which they can provide themselves with the necessary funds and material with which to carry on their work. It does happen sometimes, however, that club members are unable to obtain the necessary funds with which to launch the particular project which they wish to carry through the club year. This proved to be the case with two boys who wished to enter the turkey division of the poultry project, and their problems were laid before the county club agent, J. Roland Parker, whose duty it is to give all the assistance and encouragement possible to his club members.

No available funds could be secured with which to purchase the required number of turkey eggs. As is usually the case, "necessity is the mother of invention," and the club agent took the matter up with several turkey raisers of the county. Things were not promising and it seemed that failure was inevitable. The matter was taken up with Chas. R. Dear of Oakland, a progressive farmer and turkey raiser, and his cooperation secured. Mr. Dear personally worked out the scheme whereby he would furnish eight turkey eggs each to two club members in the turkey division. These club members to do the work required by their particular project, and also enter into an agreement with the county club agent by which they agree to give the same number of eggs as received by them and 25 per cent more the following year. These eggs which they give to be used in the same manner by some club members during the next club year and under the same sort of an agreement. In this way establishing a revolving account, in the form of turkey eggs, for the purpose of assisting boys and girls who wish to enter the turkey project. It is also hoped that this feature of the club work in Douglas county will serve to stimulate a greater interest in the turkey industry in the favorable producing sections.

THIRD ATTEMPT ON DRY AGENT'S LIFE IS FAILURE

SEATTLE, May 21.—Four men in an automobile drew alongside the car of William Harvey Thompson, prohibition agent here shortly after midnight and attacked him with a fusillade of pistol shots. A bullet pierced his right arm. Thompson reported that he fired nine shots at the attacking automobile as it fled. He expressed the opinion that he had wounded one of his assailants. Thompson had been the target of two previous bullet attacks in this city. In one attack he was wounded. Thompson said that when assaulted today he was going to a moonshine distillery.

LA GRANDE LAND OFFICE RESTORED

LA GRANDE, Ore., May 21.—A telegram received here early this morning from Senator Robert N. Stanford states that the United States senate has unanimously passed the Walsh bill re-establishing the La Grande and other land offices. Expect the house to pass this bill and thereby re-establish La Grande office before congress adjourns. Stanford's communication read: "The La Grande land office, which served several eastern Oregon counties before it was removed to The Dalles, was one of the pioneer land offices of the state, functioning until about 14 months ago, when it was abolished by the government."

EVANGELINE BOOTH IS AGAIN SERIOUSLY ILL.

NEW YORK, May 21.—Evangeline Booth, national commander of the Salvation Army, was today in "a very critical condition," at her home near White Plains, it was announced at the army headquarters. Miss Booth, who suffered an attack of acute appendicitis last December and has been ill most of the time since, suffered another attack last night.

BOSTON, Mass., May 21.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "Wool moved with extreme moderation in the eastern seaboard markets and not much faster in the west. Prices in both sections show little actual change, although it must be said there is still a buyers' market. The trade, however, hopes that the policy of delayed buying on the part of the clothing manufacturers will presently give way to a bigger volume of business in goods and with the mills lightly stocked with wool the reflection in the raw materials would be rather speedy. RUSSELL SCOTT SANE; GALLOWAYS AWAITS HIM

CHICAGO, May 21.—Russell Scott, convicted of murder and then sent to prison for the insane, has been found sane and must face a jury again in the gallows a possibility in the background. Scott was convicted of the murder of Joseph Maurer, drug clerk, in a holdup four years ago. Attorney General Oscar Carlstrom disclosed today that a commission of state alienists, headed by Dr. Herman Adler, state criminologist, have found that Scott is now sane.

LINCOLN COUNTY TO BE REIMBURSED FOR SPRUCE LAND TAXES

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Lincoln county, Oregon, would be reimbursed in the amount it would have received as taxes from 1919 to 1922 inclusive, from the United States Spruce Corporation, if property of the corporation were taxable, under a bill passed by the senate and sent to the house yesterday. The corporation received the property from the United States and used it for the interest of the government during the war. The property was therefore exempt from taxation.
