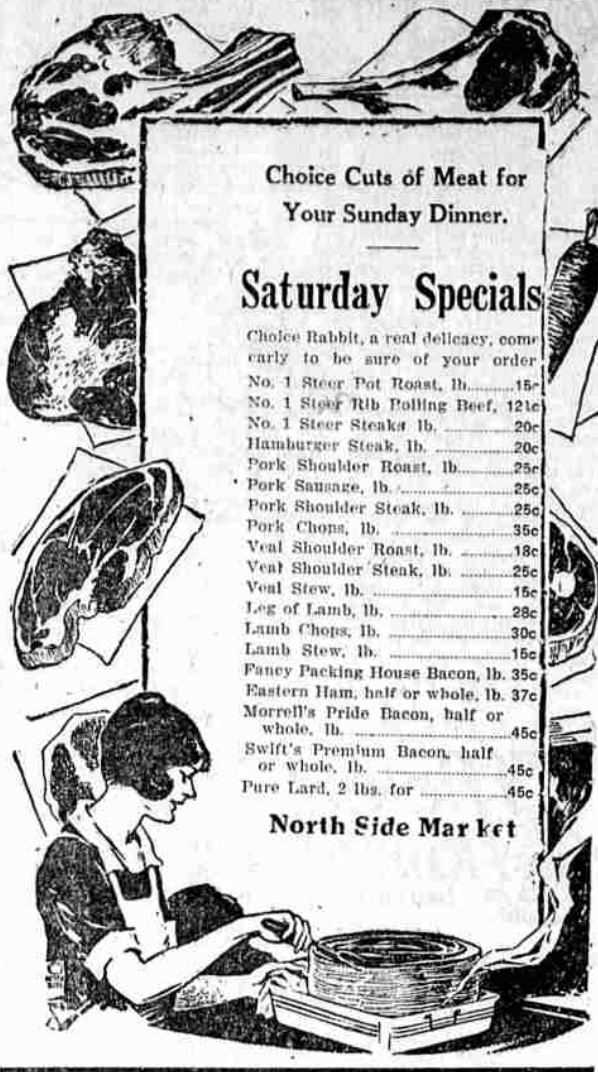

Spring Tonics

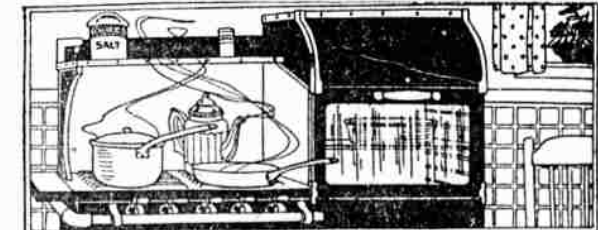


"SPRING FEVER" is the term facetiously applied to "that tired feeling" which we all get when the first mild days succeed a long winter. It is a general letting down of the energies which have been kept up by the cold. We feel lazy and unambitious, and our appetites flag.

Yet, during this period of readjustment of the human system to the change in temperature, it is essential to keep up the strength and vitality. The body needs, in particular, a fresh supply of iron. It becomes the problem of the housewife to serve such foods as will not only tempt the appetites of her family, but re-energize their systems.

Children, too, suffer from this general "letting down" in the early spring. Formerly, herb-teas and certain medicines were administered as "spring tonics." But nowadays it is considered more effective to eat foods rich in iron, than to dose with medicines containing that element. For in food we get nourishment as well as a tonic.

All green vegetables, such as spinach, cabbage (sauerkraut), asparagus, Brussels sprouts and lettuce are rich in iron and vitamins. So are carrots. Spinach and sauerkraut are additionally valuable as system-cleaners. As most of these vegetables may be had, regardless of the season, by buying them in tins, we need not wait for our spring tonics. Rhubarb is another excellent tonic, because of its refreshing and appetizing "tang." It also may be purchased in cans, when the fresh is unavailable. It is particularly good for us in the springtime.



A Dollar Dinner for Four

Planning an inexpensive dinner menu every day, for a family of four, taxes the ingenuity of the housewife. The following suggestions for a \$1.00 menu may prove welcome.

Chicken Broth
Baked Beans with Onions and Bacon
Escalloped Tomatoes
Whole Wheat Bread and Butter
Quick Cherry Cobbler
Coffee

EXCELLENT brands of chicken broth may be had for 15 cents a can. Two medium-size cans of baked beans, required for four people, cost at the rate of 3 cents for 25c, at sales making 2 cost 17c. For escalloped tomatoes, 1 large can at the rate of 2 for 25 cents costs 13 cents. A small loaf of whole wheat bread costs 10 cents. Enough coffee for four people, at an average cost of 40 cents a pound,

is about 4 cents. A can of cherries for the Quick Cherry Cobbler costs about 20 cents. It is made thus—Drain the syrup from a can of sweetened cherries and put the fruit into a buttered casserole. Sift 2 cups prepared cake flour and mix with 2/3 cup of water. Beat well and pour over fruit. Bake 20 to 30 minutes in moderate oven. Serve with sauce made from thickened cherry syrup. The above items of food come to a total of 88 cents. 12 cents may be allowed to cover the cost of the sliced onion to be mixed with the beans, 3 slices of bacon for top of beans in casserole, flour for cobbler, butter and sugar for the meal.

FAMOUS ORCHESTRA COMING TUESDAY

The name of Herb Wiedoeft is quite a household word in all parts of the United States, and the announcement that he is bringing his celebrated orchestra to Roseburg on next Tuesday night for an evening of dancing and entertainment is welcome news to the thousands who are familiar with his remarkable personality and the splendid art of his orchestra.

For this personality has drawn to it an extraordinary group of musicians, all of them leaders in their profession, and has held them together without any changes over a period of years, so that the ensemble now has achieved that high perfection in rhythm and tonal color for which it is noted.

Last year Wiedoeft presented his orchestra in New York at both theater and dance engagements. He carefully prepared programs of dance numbers dealing with the various types of modern dance music and demonstrated the musical value and interest of such works, more, he demonstrated, as did Paul Whiteman some years ago, that the West is the home of real modern jazz and the latest in syncopation.

Wiedoeft and his orchestra beat all previous dance records on this tour east, showing conclusively that modern jazz was not a passing phase but had a grip on native life that was unshakable. Wiedoeft intends to sell jazz throughout the United States this summer as though it were canned milk or any such commodity. The importance and pulling power of jazz in American suburban and urban life were demonstrated by Paul Whiteman, who took a transcontinental tour with his concert band recently. He did not give dances, but he gave concerts in towns of medium population. Yet he averaged \$5000 a concert, an unheard of sum for theatricals. Jazz is, therefore, potentially a world wide industry.

Herb Wiedoeft's engagement at the armory is for the one dance only and it is your only chance to hear and dance to this famous organization. The assurance that the orchestra comes without any change in its personnel should be a guarantee of a splendid evening's entertainment.

Frederick Steiwer, Pendleton grain grower, maintained his substantial lead over Robert N. Stanfield for the Republican nomination for United States senator as additional returns from yesterday's primary election were tabulated today.

Steiwer profited from the split up of the Republican vote of Oregon due to the fact that there were eight candidates in the field. Political observers recalled that the race for the nomination for senator became a sort of free-for-all among Republicans following the incident at Baker, Oregon, about a year and a half ago when Senator Stanfield was arrested on a charge of drunkenness in a cafe. Senator Stanfield never appeared in court to answer the charge, and from that time there sprang up a crop of aspirants for the toga via the Republican nomination.

Senator Stanfield was a supporter of President Coolidge, but that factor did not enter into the campaign.

Close Race in Jackson.
MEDFORD, Ore., May 22.—In the race for senator from Jackson county George Dunn of Ashland, incumbent, was leading Ralph Cowgill of Medford, present representative, 1078 to 1059, with 29 rural precincts missing.

Finest Ivory Taken From Male Elephant

Strictly speaking, ivory is a term confined to material represented by the tusk of the elephant, and for commercial purposes almost entirely to that of the male elephant. Both male and female African elephants produce good-sized tusks.

In the Indian variety the female is much less profitably provided, while less than 1 per cent of the elephants of Ceylon have tusks of any value. Ivory is a very dense substance; the pores are close and compact and filled with a gelatinous solution, which contributes to the beautiful polish that can be given to ivory. The tusk of the elephant, from which the ivory is obtained, may be placed between bone and horn. It is more fibrous than bone and, therefore, less easily torn or splintered.

The tusks of the walrus correspond to the canine teeth of other mammals, and they are not true ivory although so called. They are inferior in quality to the ivory of the elephant.

Great Voices Called Accidents of Nature

Great voices are rare and, undoubtedly owe their wonderful purity of tone to an accidental combination of those physical characteristics which lead to the production of song. The human musical instrument, though built of living tissue, resembles in structure the reed organ pipe fitted with a vocal human stop. In both cases the tone depends on the vibrations of a column of air produced in the organ by a reed and in the voice by the vocal cords. The throat, mouth and nasal cavities form the resonators which, by alteration in shape and size, are able to pick out and emphasize certain component parts of the fundamental tones produced in the lungs. The lungs form the bellows which produce the upward blast of air, and upon their quality depends the loudness of the voice.—London Daily Mail.

Famous Eastern Conqueror

One of the most delightful spots in the vicinity of Kabul is the high-walled garden known as the Baber Bagh. In the corner of which is the grave of one of the greatest men that ever lived, Baber, "The Tiger," who founded the dynasty of the Mughals. Baber's shrine is a place of pilgrimage not for Afghans alone but for people from all parts of central Asia. It was in this garden, or just such another, says Mr. Lowell Thomas, that Baber made his plans to lead his Tartar horsemen and burly nomads down to the rich plains of Panjshir, near Delhi, where he fought one of the most decisive battles of Asia in 1526. Such colossal booty fell into his hands that he was able to give \$10000 to each of his chief officers, and corresponding rewards in silver and rare silks to everyone, not only in his army, but in his kingdom.

Graceful Garment Is Latin-American Ruana

The ruana is the Colombian equivalent of the poncho, so widely used elsewhere in Latin-America. It is somewhat less ample than the latter, measuring usually four to five feet in diameter; it is square and made of two strips of native woolen cloth sewed together, leaving a slit in the center through which the head of the wearer can be thrust.

My description may not give the impression of an elaborate, nor yet an elegant garment; but I have never seen anything more expressive of unaffected grace than the manner in which a country gentleman of the Colombian Andes dons his ruana when mounting for his morning ride about the hacienda. With one hand he gathers up the folds and opens the slit in the center; then with a majestic toss he throws it over his head, allowing the folds to fall upon his back and shoulders. If the weather is fair, he turns up the two corners in front and drops them over each shoulder.

For the cold winds and drizzling rains of the high Andes, there is no better garment than the ruana, unless it be the woolen poncho of Ecuador, thicker and larger, to meet the more rigorous climate to which its wearer is exposed. It is warm, it keeps out the rain, and at night it serves as a grateful addition to the slender allotment of blankets supplied in most Andean inns.—Wilson Popeno in the National Geographic Magazine.

Hardly Draw Breath During Winter Sleep

The mild weather sometimes observed during winter occasionally wakes before their time animals which have been spending the winter buried in the ground or in trees. While these creatures are asleep, often for months, respiration seems to be totally suspended. A hedgehog was recently immersed in a pail of cold water, and though the ducking was continued for 30 minutes the animal was taken out unharmed. So slight was its breathing that practically no water entered its lungs.

Marmots and bats have been placed in glass chambers filled with carbon dioxide. In their normal state they have expired almost immediately, but in their winter sleep they have survived after four hours in the glass chambers.

Extreme cold will sometimes kill six months' slumbers, but there have been notable exceptions in the case of animals with cold blood. Occasionally they have been brought to life when taken from solid blocks of ice; frogs have been known to recover after ice has formed in their blood.

Tribute to Franklin

For 68 years Benjamin Franklin served his country and mankind, and history affirms the judgment of his contemporaries, expressed most notably in the tribute adopted by the national assembly of France upon announcement of his death. Offering the resolution, which was seconded by Rochefoucauld and Lafayette, Mirabeau declared: "The sage whom two worlds claim as their own, the man for whom the history of science and the history of empire contend with each other, held without doubt a rank in the human race. Antiquity would have raised altars to this mighty genius, who, to the advantage of mankind, compassing in his mind the heavens and the earth, was able to restrain almighty thunderbolts and tyrants. Europe, enlightened and free, owes at least a token of remembrance to the man, the greatest men who have ever been engaged in the service of philosophy and liberty."

Old-Time Hosiery

Hose is really the old term for what amounted to our modern trousers and stockings combined, our ancestors at one period wearing a garment something like the "legginette" now so popular for small children.

As centuries passed and the fashions changed, first breeches and then trousers came in, and the old one-piece garment disappeared. We still kept its name, however, but only applied it to the tight-fitting covering of the lower limbs, and even this in time we took to calling by another name, the stocking.

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Dan Beard Organized American Boy Scouts

The experiences of Lieut. Gen. Sir Robert S. S. Baden-Powell of the British army with boys as messengers during the Boer war in South Africa so impressed him that he came later to devote almost his entire time to work with boys. He organized the boy scouts in England, and from there the movement spread to most other countries, and the membership has grown until it now includes millions of boys.

"The boys' general," however, freely acknowledges his debt to movements of a similar character in the United States. And so, although the Boy Scouts of America were not incorporated until 1910, which was some little time after the British organization had been formed, the scouts in this country really date to a boys' organization founded by Daniel Carter Beard—Dan Beard—about 1905. This body became, with another founded by Ernest Thompson Seton, the foundation of the American scouts.

Colonies Classified

In 1900 the American colonies were divided under the following classifications: Royal, proprietary and republican. The classification is based upon the three different methods by which their governors obtained office. At this date the following colonies were royal: New Hampshire, Massachusetts, New York, Virginia and Maryland (temporarily). The proprietary colonies were Pennsylvania, Delaware, New Jersey and the Carolinas. Of the latter group only the first two remained proprietary. The rest became royal, while Maryland was restored to the Baltimore family. Rhode Island and Connecticut retained their elective governors and so may be classed as republican.

Thought of Insects

Among the higher invertebrates—the ants, bees, wasps and other social insects—there is a complex behavior which has been interpreted by some to imply a consciousness comparable with that of man. Others have emphasized the instinctive character of the actions of these animals and have been content to consider the higher insects as mere automata. The insects represent a line of evolution that has culminated in man, and it is difficult to compare the insect mind with human consciousness. Either the performances of bees and ants are largely reflex or must be attributed to a very complex affective consciousness.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22.—No change in print but prices over the week is hardly likely, according to local creamerymen. Production has been heavy during the past week and cooler holdings have mounted steadily. On the exchange cube prices have worked fractionally lower.

Eggs cooled off again at the close of the week, losing yesterday's gain. On the dairy exchange firsts are back a cent to 26 cents. Other grades held steady.

Live poultry is in poor demand, especially broilers and the market is tending lower. Receipts are liberal and some stocks will be carried over. Light broilers 20 to 23 cents. Heavy broilers 20 to 23 cents. Hens unchanged. Limited offerings of berries for the Saturday demand kept prices firm on the early growers market today. Best Oregon brought \$2 to \$2.25 right from the start but later stocks sold at \$2 and \$2.20 a crate.
