The wrap, of turquoise silk with hand-painted flowers in pale orchid, is lined with orchid chiffon and fringed in blue. This type of wrap is most effective when smartly draped about the shoulders. It is one of the season's newest fancies and will undoubtedly carry its popularity into the summertime where its lightness and beauty will be appreciated.

In a measure, the hand-painted shawl with deep fringe has succeeded the Spanish shawl in the spring mode. It gives more color

in combinations of colors and fabrics and forms the most graceful of evening coverings. The wrap is not alone in featuring fringe, however, for the cape or coat which is so smartly worn in the springtime is frequently found in graceful silhouette featuring fringe for additional motion.

Scarfs, which are so much seen on the newest coats and capes, are very chic when they terminate in deep fringes. These fringes harmonize with the fringed endings of the wrap.

Frocks, too, are featuring fringe in obtaining a flattering silhouette. The bolero type of frock, which appears in the evening mode as well as the afternoon, is smartly outlined at the bolero, as well as giving a tiered effect by the skillful placing of fringe in three rows on the skirt.

The fluttering silhouette is frequently obtained with the utmost chic by the careful and artistic use of fringe.

Scarfs, which are so popular in sports costumes, are heavily fringed. And the woollens in lovely pastel shades which appear at sports occasions are frequently made smart by the use of deep woolen fringes.

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
