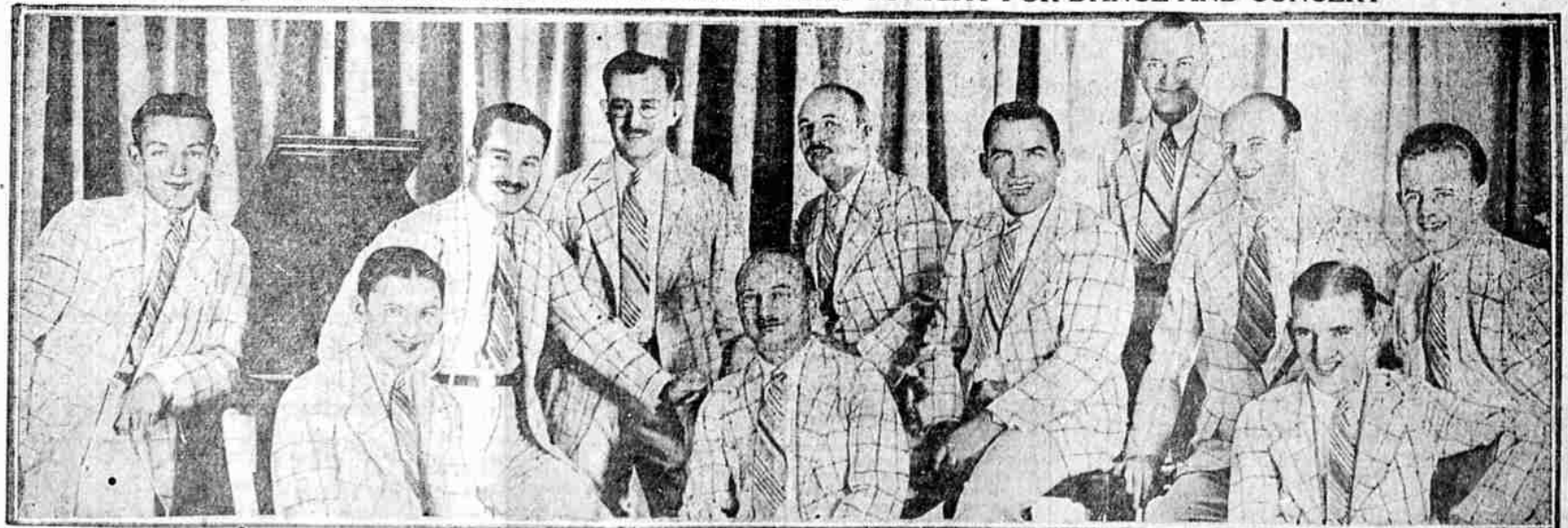

HERB WIEDEFT ORCHESTRA COMING TO ARMORY TONIGHT FOR DANCE AND CONCERT



The sweet dance melodies of the famous Herb Wiedoeft Cinerella Orchestra from the beautiful Roof by that name in Los Angeles are to become a part of Roseburg tonight at the Armory. Every home that has a phonograph is familiar with the tang-

ling rhythm and sparkling color of their dance music. Herb and his orchestra are to be the extra feature at the Armory for tonight only, but everyone can dance to and hear them. Wiedoeft is said to be the highest priced dance orchestra outside of New York and ranks among the four greatest recording bands in
