The products and manufacturers of the Oregon country have been assembled in a book of 66 pages. It makes a surprising as well as gratifying showing for the industrial resources of the Oregon country.

This is the first complete directory of the manufactured products of this state that has been compiled and is published by the Oregon Manufacturers' Association, Portland. It is compiled especially for the benefit of purchasing agents, merchandise buyers, manufacturers and distributors of all sorts of commodities.

The preface declares that the book has been published "with the definite purpose of securing additional markets and outlets for the products of the Oregon country."

The contents include classifications of commodities, an alphabetical list and personnel of industrial firms, a geographical section giving the industries by towns, together with population, etc., a section on the transportation facilities of the state and a list of general references, a list of consular agents and a list of foreign markets.

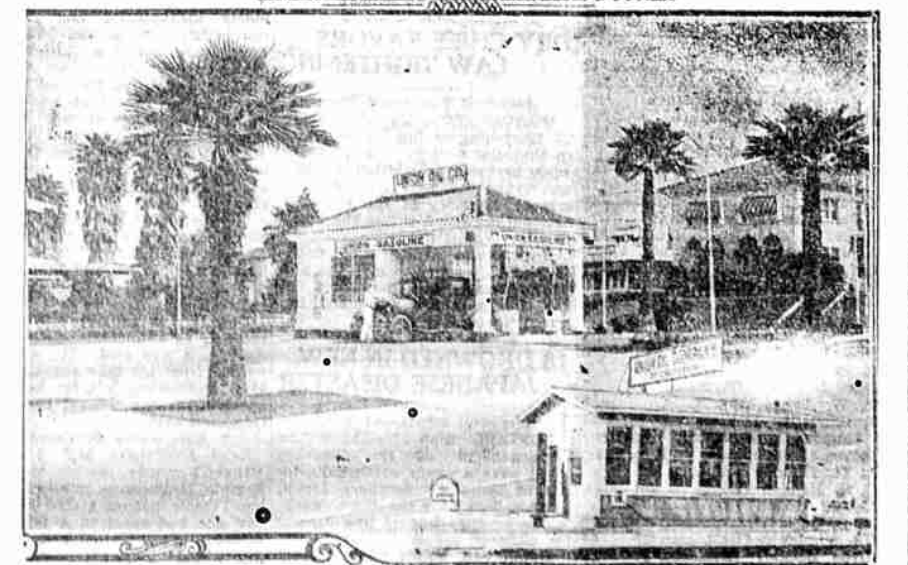
