FIRST RAIL JOURNEY OVER NATRON CUTOFF

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 27.—First bona-fide passengers actually made the trip from Eugene to Klamath Falls over the Natron cut-off by rail arrived here yesterday in the persons of Mr. and Mrs. Frank F. Eddy of Eugene. Armed with a blanket pass they rode work trains, hand cars and speeders to complete the journey, which occupied them from Monday morning to Wednesday forenoon.

Square Receptacle for Goldfish Always Best
 According to a bureau of fisheries bulletin, because of its narrow neck, the so-called fish globe is not adapted to keeping goldfish in a comfortable and healthy state. Its small amount of water surface not permitting the processes of absorption of air on a scale sufficient for the well-being of the fish. Another objectionable feature of the globe lies in its refraction of light rays, which tends to make the fish nervous and uneasy. An aquarium with straight sides is the most suitable for goldfish.

It should be of rectangular shape and of equal width at the top and bottom. The top should be covered with a jar, which may be purchased in the five-gallon size, will give good results. The depth of water should be about the same as the width of the aquarium, and the bottom should be covered with clean sand and gravel to the depth of one and one-half inches. Ordinary washed sand and pebbles are best for this purpose, as the more desirable aquarium plants draw most of their nourishment from the water and require merely an anchorage. In order to insure an abundant air supply, plants of high oxygenating powers should be selected for the aquarium.

Cleanliness, good light, plants well distributed over the quantity, proper food of moderate quality, prompt removal of sick fish, and avoidance of overstocking are the essential factors for the maintenance of a successful aquarium.

Smoke Proved There Was Food in Homes
 Smoking chimneys may be an awful nuisance in large cities, but there was a time in Japan when the sight of effusive chimneys so pleased a monarch of the country that he wrote a poem about it.

It was during a famine in the reign of Emperor Nintoku, according to "Peter Simple," in the London Post, and there was great suffering. Nintoku climbed to the balcony of his palace and saw a thick smoke rising from the chimneys of the city. He at once exclaimed to his people from taxation for the year.

Later he climbed to the roof again and saw smoke rising from almost all the chimneys. Whereupon he committed these lines:

On my roof
 Climbing when I look out
 I see smoke rising
 The people's kitchens
 Are in a flourishing condition.

Old-Time Press Censor of Reactionary Mind
 The first Englishman of any distinction to take up journalism as a profession was Sir Roger L'Estrange, who died 221 years ago.

He was an ardent pamphleteer on the epoch of the Restoration, and in 1692 was made "surveyor of the press," the censor of all books and pamphlets and the editor of a monopolistic newspaper, called the Intelligencer.

The reactionaries and die-hards of today would certainly welcome Sir Roger with open arms, for he wrote that the publication of any but the most carefully edited news "makes the multitude too familiar with the actions and counsels of their superiors, too pragmatical and censorious, and gives them not only a wish, but a kind of color, to be difficult to the meddling with the government."

He failed miserably in his attempt to stamp out the freedom of the press—or, its early ideal—and when deprived of his monopoly, he himself turned to the publication of an unofficial "catchpenny" sheet, called the Observer.—Chicago Journal.

Deodorizing Cigar Box
 If the cigar box is made from Spanish cedar, as the good ones are supposed to be made, it would be rather difficult to deodorize it completely, since the odor is due to a resin in the wood which is fairly well distributed throughout the wood structure. If the box is made from some other wood which does not have much natural odor, but which may have taken up some odor from the tobacco, it might be that a thorough airing or perhaps washing with gasoline would remove the odor. The odor of Spanish cedar is due to a volatile oil in the resin, and this oil can be removed at least from the surface of the wood by steaming. Since, however, a very little steaming might warp the box or discolor it, or soften the glue, the method is not advised from all parts of the world. Probably long-continued exposure to the air and sunlight is the most practical method.

One-Word Sermon
 The word "news" is made up of the four letters that indicate the main points of the compass—N., S., E. and W. In a book published more than a century ago, the author comments upon this in a way that is by no means out of date at the present time. He says: "As news implies the intelligence received from all parts of the world, the very word itself points out its meaning. N, the north; E, the east; W, the west, and S, the south. This expressive word also recommends the practice of the following virtues: Nobleness in our thoughts, Equity in our dealings, Wisdom in our counsels, and Sobriety in our enjoyments."

Seek More Nicotine
 Nicotine, not less of it, but more, is wanted by tobacco-breeding plant scientists at the state agricultural experiment station at Geneva, N. Y. This reversal of usual tobacco requirements is being sought for the benefit of the insecticide industry, which makes large use of nicotine in the manufacture of insect poisons. Certain "wild" tobaccos are being found more promising than the cultivated varieties and are being experimented with to learn of increasing their already high nicotine content.

Courage Crowning Virtue
 Courage is a gem of the first water. Its association is with the brave and noble. Its contrast is the coward and his meanness. It is the virtue that makes the difference between a true man and one living below the line of his privileges.

Courage means something more than bravery. Bravery belongs to the battlefield, but courage moves in quiet places and grows like the "moss" rather in the shade. It takes grit to be courageous. It is more telling than thrilling.—London Tit-Bits.

FARM POINTERS.
 Leg weakness in small chicks is due to such causes as poor breeding stock, improper regulation of incubator heat, and later of brooder heat.

Broody hens frequently cause fertile eggs to spoil. The remedy is to remove the male birds from the flock as soon as the hatching season is over.

Feeds which may be harvested and advantageously fed directly to stock are vetch and rye, crimson clover, oats and vetch, red clover, mammoth red clover, alfalfa clover, peas and oats, turnips, buckwheat, corn, kale, mangels, and rutabagas and carrots, says the experiment station.

Rotation of crops including flax, according to the experiment station, is the recommended practice in Oregon. Flax fits in well with cultivated crops such as clean cultivated corn. One of the systems of rotation found satisfactory, is a legume crop, such as field peas, alfalfa, vetch or red clover, followed by a cultivated crop like corn, beans or potatoes, then flax.

The smother crop system for the eradication of Canada thistles and morning glories usually has not been successful in Oregon. In western Oregon on some of the rich moist soils the experiment station has found a thick planting of hemp at about 11 bushels per acre, will so completely overshadow the Canada thistles as to practically eliminate it.

The little house ants which are so common in Oregon, and a nuisance in many homes, are usually exterminated with tartar emetic, says the entomologist of the experiment station. The tartar emetic is weighed out by the druggist in three-grain lots, and mixed with four tablespoonfuls of syrup. The poison is mixed with small chips or bread crumbs, which the ants carry into their nest to feed the young.

"Pip" is treated by cleaning the nostrils by sucking or syringing with a boric acid solution, or other mild antiseptic, using some of the same in the mouth. The dried tip of the tongue is then anointed with sweet oil or vaseline, allowing the "pip" to remain attached.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 27.—The local butter market is displaying a healthier one with board prices fractionally higher on cubes. Extras are back up to 35c while ordinary grades are steady and unchanged. Fresh eggs are higher on the local dairy exchange with extras and firsts up a cent at 28 and 27 cents respectively; current receipts were posted a half cent higher at 25c.

Country dressed hogs have reached the 20-cent level in the local market, with fancy stuff up to 20c cents. Not enough pork is in today to test values but the first arrivals are expected to sell well above 20 cents. Packers are now quoting 22c on dressed hogs and paying up to 15c for live stuff at the yards. Country killed calves are scarce, too, along the street and choice light veal is firm at 15c to 16c.

Commission firms are hoping that the consuming public will turn to poultry now that the shortage of hogs and calves has become so acute. Receipts along the street are liberal and the market very weak, although an attempt is being made to maintain prices.

Portland jobbers will advance wholesale sugar prices 10c a sack at the opening of business Friday morning. The boost in prices follows a similar rise in the refinery list at San Francisco. New prices on cane will be 46.25 with beet at 46.15 a sack.
