Horrible Methods of Treating the Insane

Until within the last century insane persons were treated with terrible cruelty in nearly all "civilized" countries, and as late as 1770 lunatics were exhibited at public fairs in England, and as late as 1815 there were exposures of terrible cruelties in the Bethlehem hospital in England, and this led to gradual improvements and the introduction of enlightened and scientific methods in the care of the mentally afflicted.

One of the mildest of the old forms of treatment of mad people, and long in vogue at Strathgillan, in Perthshire, Scotland, was connected with the observance of the festival of St. Fillan, a Scottish saint.

Insane people were dipped in the "holy pool," where St. Fillan had bathed in the Seventh century. Many quaint ceremonies were connected with this "ducking." After the immersion the lunatics were herded to St. Fillan's chapel, and strapped to the floor, to be left all night.

Those who managed to free their bonds and escape were considered cured. Experience did not bear out this pious belief, however, and the custom gradually declined.

Music Shown to Have Odd Effect on Hair

If all the violinists in the world assembled together in one vast building, and they numbered, say, 100,000, it is probable that there would be but 100 among them with bald heads. But if the same number of brass instrument players were inspected, bald heads would be as common as flies in summer time!

If you doubt this, make a point of observing the heads of the orchestras in the cinemas or theaters you patronize.

Scientists declare that the playing of stringed instruments induces hair growth. A series of experiments on the partly bald has proved that stringed music has power to raise a hairy crop!

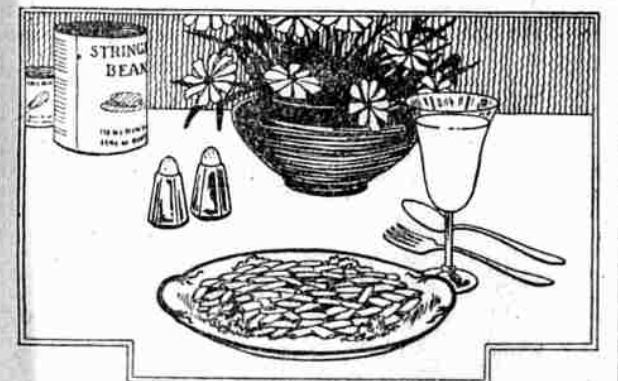

THE STRINGLESS BEAN A Modern Improvement

THAT most particular of cooks, the French chef—to whom cookery is almost a sacred rite—has not been slow to take advantage of the convenience and excellent quality of stringless beans. These are merely string beans in canned form, with all the tedious stringing, cutting, and cooking expertly done in the process of canning. The French chef has found that their succulence and flavor have been perfectly preserved in the can. The mere cooking of food does not interest him. It is the flavoring, the seasoning, the dressing up, that places his work in the creative class. So, whenever possible he buys those foods that are ready-cooked, and devotes his art to fashioning them into masterpieces of epicurean delight.

Heat the contents of a can of stringless beans, and drain off the liquor. While hot, pour over them two teaspoonsful of vinegar and one teaspoonful of onion-juice, with salt and pepper to taste. Let stand until cold. Just before serving, stir in three tablespoonsful of olive oil.

Brains Minor Factor in Financial Success

If you set out in this world to make money, your success will depend more on your personality than on intelligence or ability as a scholar. And a sense of humor won't help you so very much, either.

What you will need to stock up on are the traits usually displayed in abundance by self-made men of so many "success" stories: aggressiveness, enthusiasm, accuracy in work and self-reliance.

A study of the biographical relation between personality and income has been made at Purdue university and the traits that go hand in hand with money making are listed in order of their importance. Typical college men, who were graduated from engineering school five years ago were taken as subjects for the study.

Originality and address are of more monetary importance in personality than neatness and sincerity, the investigation indicates. Reasoning abilities stand twelfth in the series of 23 personal traits correlated with income. Moral habits are the last thing in personality makeup that has any connection with financial success.—Kansas City Star.

Parent of Languages

Sanskrit is the ancient classical tongue of the Hindus, and the oldest preserved form of Aryan, or Indo-European, language in existence. It ceased to be spoken about the fourth century B. C., and is preserved only in the Hindu sacred writings. Sanskrit is the parent of all modern Aryan languages of India, and the language most closely related to the original tongue of the ancient Aryan, from which have descended the Celtic, Greek, Latin, Teutonic, Slavonic and Persian languages. Sanskrit literature, which begins with the Vedas, extends back as far as 2000 or 1500 B. C. Sanskrit is still cultivated as a classical language by the Hindus, and remains the sacred language of the Brahmins.—Kansas City Star.

SEAPLANE FALLS INTO COOS BAY; 3 MEN ARE INJURED

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 25.—Seaplane number two, Alaskan survey expedition, fell three hundred feet into Coos Bay about noon today and three men were seriously injured.
