SWEETSER IS ONLY AMERICAN GETTING GOLF TITLE CHANCE

MURFIELD, Scotland, May 28.—Jesse Sweetser of New York, reached the final of the British amateur golf championship today by defeating W. G. Brownlow of Ireland, in their semi-final match at the 21st hole.

Sweetser will play S. F. Simpson, a young Scotchman tomorrow for the championship. Simpson won his semi-final match from Arthur Jamieson, Jr., 2 and 1.

Bobby Jones, his magic expander against Robert Harris in their match of yesterday, fell before Arthur Jamieson, Jr., a brave Scotch lad, four and three, this morning.

Sweetser came through against Robert Scott, Jr., by the margin of two holes.

Sweetser played superlative golf during the last half of his morning match to win two up from Scott.

The American was two down at the ninth, largely due to his indifferent putting. He braced up on this feature of his game at the turn, however, taking the ninth when Scott missed a short putt.

The crucial point came at the seventeenth when Scott, in addressing the ball for his second shot, moved it. Penalized for this, he pulled into the rough and lost the hole, squaring the match.

On the eighteenth, both approaches were good, but Sweetser's was the better and when Scott missed a fairly short putt and Jesse dropped his cleanly, the match and the chance for Britain's premier golf title were the American's.

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—An order for a coffin four times the size of an average one marked the first step today in the preparation for the funeral of Theodore Valenzuela, known in the showbusiness as Tom Tom.

Valenzuela died yesterday. He weighed 945 pounds and of this weight more than 100 pounds were gained during the last month of his life.

MEAT COMPANY'S AGENT FACES BIG THEFT ACCUSATION

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 28.—J. Fred Struthers, manager of Waechter Bros. Meat company at Fairbanks, for seven years until February this year, was bound over to a federal grand jury at Fairbanks yesterday on charge of embezzling \$17,950.08. He was released on \$12,500 bail.

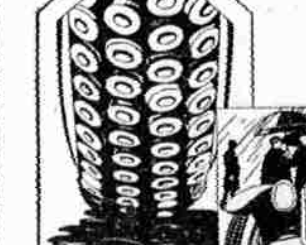

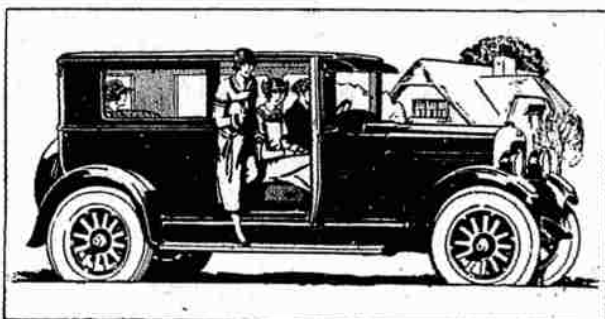
