TWO COUNTRIES PAY HONOR TO JOHN ERICSSON

by that courage which is the foundation of military achievement, that devotion to the home which is the foundation of patriotism, and that reverence for religion which is the foundation of moral power. They are representative of the process which has been going on for centuries in many quarters of the globe to develop a strain of heroes ready to make their contribution to the civilization of America.

In this connection he mentioned one American of Swedish blood who is "endowed with the old Norse spirit," Senator La Follette, Republican, Wisconsin, who is a candidate for re-nomination and election this year.

The Senator was described as "a learned lawyer, blessed with great ability, possessed of high character, a seasoned parliamentarian with a record of prominent leadership in the legislative of his own state and in the Congress of the United States." * * * a true American."

Norse Blood in Civil War. Discussing the battle of the Monitor and Merrimack, the President recalled that it was Ericsson who built the Monitor, the "turret ship" which, armed with a single gun, fought her, a significant example of the power of the Norse element in the American navy.

"The old spirit of the Vikings, becoming American," he added in commenting upon the outcome of the battle, "had again triumphed in a victory no less decisive of future events than when it had hovered over the banner of William the Conqueror. It did for the Union cause on the sea what the Battle of Gettysburg later was to do on land."

Prince Responds.

Responding to the address of President Coolidge, Prince Gustav-Adolph, after expressing his appreciation of the wonderful reception accorded to him, said in part:

"We of Sweden rejoice in the unveiling of this mighty symbol, erected by the people and government of the United States to perpetuate their recognition of what Captain John Ericsson achieved not only at the crucial moment, but during a life time of unremitting effort. We are happy to know that so many Americans of Swedish origin have contributed to the completion of this monument acknowledging as their ideal the life of John Ericsson, dedicated in gratitude to the country of his birth, and in loyal devotion to that which he made his own."

"To us Swedes, this celebration of John Ericsson's memory is expressive of something more significant than his great contributions to modern science. John Ericsson is the incarnation of our desires and hopes for an unbroken friendship with America. He is both a promise and a fulfillment; in him are represented the common aims and aspirations of two free peoples imbued alike with democratic ideals."

Hands Across the Sea. "On this occasion, Mr. President, may I be permitted as a representative of Sweden to convey a very sincere greeting from John Ericsson's native country and from his birthplace. We wish to give vent to our cordial feelings for your enlightened and thrifty people, whose high ideals are well known all over the world. And we wish to express our admiration for your great and prosperous country, so full of resources of all kinds. It is our fervent hope that the bonds of friendship uniting the

Weight of the Air

The poet writes of "trifles light as air" and we often talk of the "airy nothing," but the atmosphere which surrounds our planet and accompanies it on its journeys through space is not so light as we often imagine. Its average pressure is 15 pounds to the square inch.

The barometer, as its name implies, is an atmosphere weigher, and on the varying weights, noted over large areas, depend our daily weather forecasts. A change of an inch in the height of the mercury column means a change of atmospheric weight of half a pound per square inch on the earth's surface, so that even a change of one-tenth of an inch in the barometer represents 8,000 tons per square mile. A change of an inch over an area the size of the British Isles signifies the colossal total of considerably more than 100,000,000,000 tons of air. Brief Stories.

Use Salt Sparingly

Did you use 120 pounds of salt last year? If not you did not get your share, for according to the United States bureau of mines, there were 6,803,115 short tons of this necessary substance used or sold by producers in the United States in 1924. Even then Americans used salt more sparingly, for in the year before the allowance per person was about 127 pounds. Over a third of all this salt is in the form of brine and the rest is evaporated and rock salt. New York, Michigan and Ohio produce nearly four-fifths of all the salt in the United States, and Kansas, Louisiana and California practically all the rest.

Famous Bank's Nickname

The origin of "The Old Lady of Threadneedle Street," the nickname of the Bank of England, never has been definitely established, according to the Kansas City Star, but the London Economist traces the appellation back as far as May 22, 1707, when William Pitt induced parliament to suspend cash payments at the bank. This moved Gilroy to draw his famous cartoon, which shows an old lady, seated on a chest labeled "Bank of England," being savagely attacked by Pitt.

But, it is argued, Gilroy may have made use of an old idea. As early as 1605, a medallion appeared, and still appears on the bank's notes. It consists of a seated, draped figure, with the head uncovered, holding a sprig in one hand and a spear in the other, and throughout more than two hundred years it has remained substantially the same.

Old Language Revived

Creditable and hopeful though it may be for a revival of Hebrew culture, the establishment of a Hebrew university in Jerusalem does not begin to compare in importance with the fact that little children are again talking, playing their games and calling each other names in that language of the prophets, which had once been classed as one of the world's dead tongues. Zangwill said that the index of life is speech. This is true. A people that speaks is not dead. And in order that world Jewry may share in this renaissance, which Sophie Irene Loeb called "the greatest experiment of the century," there must be somewhere in this world a place where the Jew will have at least cultural predominance. And that place is Palestine.—Pierre Van Passanen, in the Atlanta Constitution.

Many London Bridges

London bridge has never actually fallen down. Old London bridge, begun in 1170, was completed in 1209. It carried a row of timber houses, which were frequently burned down, but the main structure existed until the beginning of the Nineteenth century. The old bridge was the center for bookbinders and other tradesmen. On it stood the chapel of St. Thomas of Canterbury, and a tower on which the heads of traitors were exposed to view. The present London bridge was begun in 1824 and completed in 1831. It is borne on five granite arches, is 928 feet high, 65 feet wide and 56 feet above the river.

Margaret More was the daughter of Sir Thomas More, lord chancellor of Henry VIII, the bigamous monarch. At the time of the Reformation and the king's divorce and subsequent marriage with Anne Boleyn, Henry demanded that More, an ardent Catholic, should give his assent to the marriage, which Sir Thomas refused on principle and law. He was committed to the Tower and beheaded and his head stuck upon a pike and exhibited on London bridge. Margaret, his beloved daughter, undaunted by fear or danger, had a trusty servant row her at nightfall to the bridge. She kept her boat steady in the current while the servant climbed to the pier, loosened the precious head of her father and dropped it into the lap of his devoted daughter. She buried the head in the garden of the house in Chelsea, and with no realization of the heroism of her act, she became the mainstay of the afflicted family.—Advertiser Magazine.

Old Traditions Kept

Another entry says "For cloth delivered according to ancient custom, to ministers of state and others," while there are expensive entries under the entertainment of foreign royalty "for the cost of writing and illuminating the (presentation) scroll."
