R. R. TURNER STATE SCHOOL SUPT. TILL END OF THIS YEAR

SALEM, Ore., June 1.—R. R. Turner of Dallas, democratic nominee for state superintendent of public instruction, Saturday was appointed to the office to succeed J. A. Churchill, who has resigned to accept the presidency of the new normal school at Ashland.

Mr. Turner assumed his new duties today and will serve under his appointive commission until December 31.

Mr. Turner resigned as superintendent of the Grants Pass schools in March, 1914, to accept an appointment as receiver of the United States land office at Roseburg. He served seven years in this capacity, returning to school work in 1921. In 1924 he was appointed by ex-Governor Chamberlain a member of the board of visitors to the normal schools of the state. He also served as a member of the state board of examiners for normal schools and a year ago was selected by Governor Pierce as a member of the state text book commission.

KLAMATH FALLS TO HAVE FINE AVIATION FIELD

Work has been started on the new aviation field of the Klamath air service company at Klamath Falls, according to R. A. Shelton, business manager of the firm, and the field and hangars will be completed about June first.

The company has purchased four of the latest type airplanes, one of which is already located at Klamath Falls, the remaining three are being rushed through production at the plant of the Waterhouse-Royce Airplane company located at Glendale, California.

One of the purposes of the company is the training of ambitious young men looking forward to professional flying. Another feature of the service offered by the company will be passenger carrying, both short pleasure trips and also cross country flights. This latter will be of particular benefit to the business man whose time is valuable.

Carrying United States mail is also a possibility, as contracts for the carrying of air mail are constantly being let by the post office department. A contract to carry mail from Portland to Reno, Nevada would largely supplement the present service.

As it taken very powerful planes to operate in the high altitude and rugged atmosphere of the Klamath Falls region, the planes sold by the government after the war, cannot be used there, but only the newest and most powerful types, according to Shelton.
