General Wood said that by virtue of the discretion permitted him in the Retirement Act he would hold that Filipinos who are able, physically and otherwise, to continue at work will not be permitted to retire on pay although service and age requirements of the law's provisions may have been met.

GASOLINE AND OIL COST IS ORDERED PROBED BY SENATE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, June 3.—The federal trade commission was ordered today to probe the cost of gasoline and oil in a resolution adopted today by the senate.

The resolution was introduced by Senator Trammell, Democrat, Florida, and was opposed by Senator Harrell, Republican, Oklahoma, who declared an investigation was not warranted because the price of gasoline was justified.

Senators are afraid to vote their convictions when it comes to the oil industry, the Oklahoma senator declared. "Why this is the case I do not know. It is true that in the early days reprehensible practices were indulged in in the oil industry, but business now is operated on ethical lines."

Senator Trammell had been making repeated efforts during the last few weeks to get action on his resolution which was adopted today without a record vote. House action is unnecessary.

Expense Limit Fixed.
Ten thousand dollars was the limit set today by the senate on the expenses of the special committee which is to investigate campaign expenditures in the senatorial primaries and elections this year.

This is to include traveling expenses of the committee and of witnesses, as well as clerical hire.

Senator Reed, Democrat, Missouri, was elected today chairman of the committee.

CAR UPSET IN COLLISION ON OAK AND MAIN STREETS

The car belonging to L. W. Ingles was upset this afternoon at the intersection of Oak and Main streets, when it was struck by a machine driven by Mrs. Fred Chapman. The impact lifted Mr. Ingles' car on two wheels and swerved it around against the curb, where it turned completely over and pinned him beneath it.

Ingles was assisted from underneath the car and escaped without injury. Mrs. Chapman's car was not damaged.

BROOKHART-CUMMINS RACE IN IOWA IS CHIEF ISSUE

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 3.—Approval or disapproval by the voters of the senate action naming Col. Smith W. Brookhart, the farm relief question and the senatorial record of Senator A. B. Cummins, were the chief issues being debated in the Iowa primary campaign.

Little interest centers in any other content except that for the republican senatorial nomination. The primary will be held June 7.

Col. Brookhart has been touring the state telling the voters the senate overrode the Iowa election law in ousting him, criticizing the attitude of Senator Cummins, especially on railroad legislation, and renewing his advocacy of farm relief measures and his denunciation of the "deflation" of agriculture.

Senator Cummins has been conducting his campaign through an organization centered here, while he remained in Washington as one of the leaders in the fight for farm relief measures. His supporters are basing their campaign largely upon the senators long record and drawing the voters' attention to the break between Brookhart and the regular party leaders.

Howard Clark, Des Moines lawyer, and B. Beardon of Council Bluffs, also are republican senatorial candidates.

The democratic senatorial contest centers upon J. Ray Filer of Fort Dodge, Claude R. Porter of Des Moines, and James C. Murtagh of Waterloo, all lawyers.

Only five of the eleven republican congressmen have opposition in the primary.

Governor Hammett, republican, is unopposed. A new legislature also will be elected.

ARIZONA POLO TEAM GOES EAST FOR TITLE MEETING

EL PASO, Ariz., June 3.—(A. P.)—Developed from a "squad" organization to a contender for the national intercollegiate polo championship in three years, the University of Arizona "Wildcat" polo team is on a tour of the east. The first series of games will be with the Pennsylvania Military Institute at Chester, Pa., June 5, 9 and 12.

This year the Wildcats have so far advanced they are once more ready to bid for the national title. If the games are arranged during their trip east.
