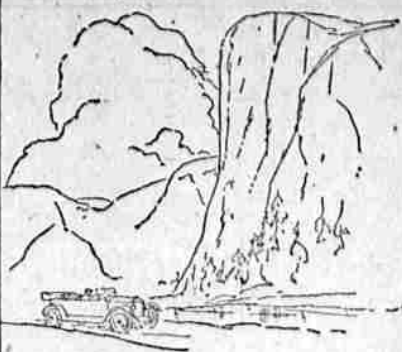

## NEW PRESIDENT OF OREGON U. WILL BE INSTALLED OCT. 18

EUGENE, Ore., June 3.—Clarence Cook Little, president of the University of Michigan, has accepted the invitation to act as installing officer at the inauguration on Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall as president of the University of Oregon. The inauguration will be October 18, on the first day of the university's semi-centennial celebration.

Bishop Walter T. Sommer has been selected to deliver the invocation at the inauguration exercises which will be held in the morning. President Little will be introduced by Judge J. W. Hamilton of Roseburg, president of the Board of Regents.

Rev. W. S. Gilbert of Astoria, member of the Board of Regents, will give the benediction.

In behalf of the alumni, P. H. Young of Portland, president of the Alumni association, will speak at the inaugural dinner. Hugh Riggs, president of the student body, will talk for the students. Governor Walter M. Pierce for the state; Mayor E. U. Lee for the city of Eugene; Dr. Carl G. Doney, president of Willamette University, for the independent colleges of Oregon; President W. J. Kerr for the Oregon Agricultural College. Several other speakers are yet to be selected.

## RAMS BRING GOOD PRICES AT PUBLIC SALE, CALIFORNIA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

DAVIS, Cal., June 3.—At the ram sale held here under the auspices of the California Wool Growers association, 893 rams brought an average price of \$50.13. Of the number 123 Ramboulllets sold for an average of \$58.72. The top ram was sold by the University of California to Hurland Brothers of Woodland for \$275. The range of the Ramboulllets averaged \$48.32.

Twelve Delaines sold at an average of \$64.60, the top Delaine selling to J. S. Nobles of Cloverdale at \$200. Six hundred and thirty Hampshire averages \$48.07 with the top sold by Frank Brown, Carleton, Oregon, to Spencer Ranch for \$625 with the next highest selling for \$600 to H. O. Harrison of Woodland. It was sold by the Mt. Hagen Stock company, Anaconda, Montana.

## LENIENCY OF WATER SUPT. AT HERMISTON MAY BE PENALIZED

PENDLETON, June 3.—H. M. Schilling, project superintendent of the Hermiston Irrigation district, who turned the water on again yesterday after receiving word from Elwood Mond, director, may face a reprimand or dismissal for being lenient with water users from April first to May 26, when the water was actually shut off. The water was officially ordered shut off from those settlers who were delinquent on the 1925 charges April 1, but owing to the pending legislation, Schilling took a lenient course and the water was not actually denied until last week. Should he receive either, there will undoubtedly be great indignation in the Hermiston area. The settlers are now regarded as being in good shape to continue operations. With the passage of the charge off bill and the omnibus bill, delinquent charges are funded and these charges along with construction charges will be paid in the future on a basis of five per cent of the annual crop production.

## THIRD ACCIDENT FATAL TO WORKER

EUGENE, Ore., June 3.—John Parich, 40, an Austrian by birth, died in a local hospital yesterday as the result of an accident in Portland a month ago.

According to the story he told here, he was buried under an avalanche of lumber in a Portland mill yard.

The accident had been his third major one in recent years. One time he fell 150 feet down a mine shaft, and was seriously hurt, but recovered. At another time he was buried alive in a mine cave-in and was without food for six days and nights.

## OREGON TRUNK AND S. P. WILL CONFER ON STATE PROJECT

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 3.—Heads of the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and the Southern Pacific railway will meet in New York on June 7 to discuss the Klamath Falls development in Oregon.

This information, obtained today at the office of President Donnelly of the Northern Pacific, said the conference would take up the Interstate Commerce Commission's recent order regarding the operation of the Oregon Trunk into Klamath Falls.

The commission's order suggested two propositions to bring the Oregon Trunk into Klamath Falls over track owned by the Southern Pacific. These propositions, it was indicated, the Oregon Trunk might be used to parallel the Southern Pacific's track. The Northern Pacific and the Great Northern jointly own the Oregon Trunk line.

## POPULATION OF STATE PRISON AT ITS RECORD MARK

SALEM, Ore., June 3.—The population of the state penitentiary today reached 573 prisoners, the highest in the history of the institution. Warden J. W. Little reported at the meeting of the state board of control. The highest previous figure was in 1915 when the total reached 566.

The board today authorized Superintendent Clark of the Portland Adult Employment Institution for the blind to discharge two inmates for insubordination. Their names were withheld by the board.

The two men refused to work at repairing chairs because their compensation for the work had been reduced slightly, due to a large order received from a Portland concern.

The board authorized Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospital, to have the school work at the hospital extended through the summer.

## TOD MORGAN WILL DEFEND HIS TITLE AGAINST EX-CHAMP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, June 3.—The junior lightweight championship, one of the flatter world's most elusive crowns, will link the East and West in a blood conflict tonight, with Steve (Kid) Sullivan of New York seeking to wrest the mantle from Tod Morgan of Seattle in a fifteen round battle.

It is only a little more than a year ago that Sullivan sat on the throne now occupied by Morgan. After a brief reign, the New York boy went down to unexpected defeat before the onslaught of Mike Ballerino of Bayonne, N. J., a fighter Sullivan previously had knocked out in five rounds. Ballerino's regime had extended over a period of only eight months when he met Morgan in San Francisco last December. Morgan lifted the diadem by a decisive victory, scoring via a technical knockout in the tenth round.

The fight brings the new champion to the east for the first time in his career to give Sullivan a chance to regain the 132 pound peak. Jack Delaney of Bridgeport, Conn., makes with Tommy Burns, Detroit heavyweight, in the ten-round semi-final.

Miske's Widow Now Singer.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 3.—A woman's contralto voice is to substitute for the big fists of "Billy" Miske, heavyweight pugilist, who died two years ago, as the bread winner for three of the fighter's children.

Miske died nearly penniless after heavy losses of his prize ring winnings in investments. Immediately Mrs. Miske began training her voice. She appeared here last night in her first recital and received an ovation.

Miske fought Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, three times—fighting the last unsuccessful battle despite a long illness in an effort to retrieve his financial losses.

## BROOKHART CENTER OF ELECTION FUSS; OPPOSES CUMMINS

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The heated Iowa campaign in which former Senator Brookhart, Republican insurgent, is opposing Senator Cummins for re-nomination on the Republican ticket, already is engaging the attention of the post office department and is producing charges and counter-charges which will probably be weighed by the special senate investigation committee.

The post office department is concerned with the insertion of Brookhart literature in franked envelopes with a speech made by Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, opposing the unsavory of Brookhart recently in favor of Daniel F. Stock, Democrat, which were mailed to Iowa voters. Responsibility for this incident has been denied by Reed, Brookhart and the latter's campaign manager, who has offered to assist in the effort to find out who put the improper matter in the envelopes.

## PORTLAND JUDGE TO PROSECUTE MINOR CHILD'S HUSBAND

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3.—The law put a period yesterday to the brief romance of 14-year-old Freda Stadter, daughter of Municipal Judge Fred W. Stadter, and her husband of one day, Theodore Riggs, 22.

Young Riggs is in the Washington county jail at Hillsboro and Freda is home, while her father is preparing to prosecute her husband of one day on charges of "enticing a minor girl away from home without her parents' consent."

The couple were located yesterday afternoon on a farm 10 miles north of Hillsboro.

## SUPREME COURT HEARS APPEAL FOR CONVICTS

SALEM, Ore., June 3.—Arguments in the case of the state against Ellsworth Kelley and James Willos, who were sentenced to death in the lower court for their part in the prison break of last August, will be heard by the supreme court today. Butter is a free fat (other free fats are oils, fat meats, etc.) and too much free fat has been proved harmful, both because it delays digestion too much and because it interferes with the absorption of mineral elements and vitamins. (Cream is not a free fat, but an emulsified fat.) McCarrison has shown that in an excess of free fat, animals may develop an enlargement of the thyroid gland (goiter). He has proved that there is a thyroid-fat-lipid relationship.
