RIO DE JANEIRO, June 3.—(A. P.)—Numerous genera of leper curing flora exist in Brazil, including one species which is thought to be more efficacious than the famous chamomilla tree of Hawaii, announced the National Agricultural Society.

The Brazilian tree which is thought to contain a superior grade of the magic ethyl ester is popularly known in Portuguese as "sapucaia." In various parts of Brazil the seed is called "leper fruit" and "leper bread," indicating that the natives believe that it cures the disease. The tree grows wild in several states.

TO MAKE ANOTHER DRIVE FOR WILD HORSES ROAMING THE FORESTS

BOZEMAN, Mont., June 3.—(A. P.)—Last year the forest service initiated the plan of rounding up and disposing of all wild horses within the confines of the national forests and plans to continue the drive this year.

In 1925 there were 300 head captured in the Gallatin national forest alone and it is estimated that there are 500 of these useless animals still within this forest range. Throughout the national forests or the state there are thousands more.

Some of these animals were at one time domesticated. They were turned out to forage for themselves and those of the least value were not rounded up. In time many of them became wild and the ones that survived the winters and predatory animals bred with other herds and thus herds were formed.

The advent of machinery has caused such a depreciation in value that many horse owners do not make claim. In this case, the forest service advertises for sale and the animals are sold to the highest bidder.

LEPROSY, TREATED EARLY, CURABLE, SAYS PHYSICIAN

MANILA, P. I., June 3.—(A. P.)—Leprosy, when treated early, is curable in fifty to seventy-five percent of the cases, declares Major A. P. Hitchens, health advisor on Governor General Leonard Wood's staff.

The Philippine Health Service is encouraged to believe that within a quarter of a century complete control of the disease in the islands, is possible. Major Hitchens said the Philippines have now reached the peak of the malady and that unless present machinery for its control and treatment breaks down, the disease will recede rapidly.
