Two resolutions condemning federal reclamation was sidetracked. A resolution to restore household furnishings to the tax roll with \$300 exemption was endorsed. A resolution to place automobiles on the tax roll was endorsed. Resolutions for stopping highway paving, increasing the percentage of automobile license fees to be returned to the counties to thirty per cent, and placing expenditures for market roads entirely in control of counties was referred to the legislative committee. None of the highway measures had sufficient support for passage, it was said.

A resolution for a severance tax on the timber and taking standing timber off the tax roll was approved. The land on which the timber stands would be taxed, however, under this proposal.

WOOL GROWERS ARE
WARNED JUST WHAT
PRICE TO EXPECT

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 5.—The wool situation has taken a decided turn for the better the last ten days. Frank J. Hagenbarth, president of the National Wool Growers association said, while passing through here enroute to his home in Spencer, Idaho. The best, however, that growers can expect this season, he explained, is a price in Boston on a parity with foreign prices. This parity is the foreign market price plus the 31 cents per pound clean tariff.

"There is no reason why wool should sell below this parity figure," he said.

Over the country as a whole, he reports, crop conditions are excellent.
