A better understanding has been created among the clubs there has been a spreading of the federation spirit a closer cooperation between the clubs, state and national has been effected, aside from many other achievements, including the publication of a state magazine. Mrs. Turner has during her administration, which has been a most harmonious one, visited with almost every club in the federation, aside from organizing and visiting new clubs.

While there, she became well known to the women's world by her distinguished work in the cause of suffrage. After going east, she served as a state member on a metropolitan daily and was a contributor to national magazines. For several years she served as executive secretary of the congressional committee of the national republican committee. During the last presidential campaign she had charge of the women's bureau of the republican national committee in the eastern states, and was herself a campaign speaker of much force and persuasive power.

For the past year and a half, Miss Stewart has been director of the junior division of the U. S. employment service. Her connection with the national federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs has extended since its birth, when she helped with a state first organization at St. Louis. Her active interest in the federation has never flagged since then. She now serves as its national legislative chairman and its representative on the joint congressional committee. The close contact with the national legislative affairs which this work involves is reflected in Miss Stewart's speeches, where it is apparent that she is in the van of organized effort for the betterment of our national life.

Another feature of the banquet program will be the informal talks by each club president, telling of the accomplishments of her club during the year. Sixty clubs will respond including 5 new clubs who have federated this year.

Hats Possess Individuality



Combinations of Materials and Lines Which Are Both New and Old Add a Note of Smartness to Spring Millinery

The new grosgrain ribbon hat, exactly matching the color of the coat, was the interesting item at the opening of the Astoria races, according to reports from Paris. These hats, narrow brimmed or brimless, high or moderately crowned, are shaped to fit every head and are designed in colors to harmonize with every smart costume.

Constance Talmadge, whose next First National offering will be "The Duchess of Buffalo," has won a notable reputation for the smartness and novelty of her millinery. The accompanying photograph shows her favoring a cloche of felt and grosgrain ribbon.

A motif of multi-colored feathers often proves an effective trimming of the grosgrain hats. Again, black "bongale" straw is a background for grosgrain ribbon in four shades of pink in the smart cloche.

The combination of straw with felt or grosgrain often appears in the new spring hats, with brims that turn up narrowly at front or back. Another attractive model is made of the loosely woven straw called trilce and is in a shade of verdigris green with a draped crown and a fan-shaped brim at the front.

Navy blue is seen in many spring models. It appears in the felt and grosgrain ribbon crown, while natural straw makes the brim. The new straws are so supple that they can be draped as easily as felt. One of the choicest models in a grey-green color, is called "silk elipse" and looks like a fabric.

Taffeta hats will doubtless be worn a good deal. As a hat material nothing can be smarter than taffeta, and, though it will not appeal to the multitude, the well-dressed woman will certainly include one in her wardrobe.

Large hats, flower trimmed or severely plain, will surely top much of the spring mode. With gowns of pastel shade and light blending coats, these large straw or silk hats will shine to best advantage. Smaller hats, often berets, may achieve newness in grosgrain of two tones of the same color, or in taffeta. New crushed crown treatments and uneven brim lines play variations on the theme of the fall.
