LOS ANGELES BOY IS DECLARED CHAMPION HIGH SCHOOL ORATOR

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, June 5.—
Herbert Wenig, 17-year-old
Los Angeles boy, has emerged
from the ranks of 2,000,000
high-school orators as the
1926 national champion. He
will defend the youth of
America in the first interna-
tional oratorical contest here
in October.

With six other regional
champions in the nation-wide
contest conducted by a group
of newspapers to foster study
of the constitution, Wenig de-
flected his praisers last night
before a crowded auditorium,
and was adjudged best by
Chief Justice Taft and Asso-
ciate Justices Vandevanter,
Sutherland, Sanford and But-
ler.

ALFALFA WEEVIL
QUARANTINE HELD
AGAIN IN EFFECT

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., June 5.—A senate
joint resolution adopted in
congress last April again made effec-
tive the statutes in Oregon and
other states providing for quaran-
tine against diseased products of
other states, although last March
the United States supreme court
held such acts invalid, says an
opinion of Attorney General Van
Winkle in reply to an inquiry by
C. A. Park of Salem, head of the
state board of horticulture.

The United States supreme court
decree held invalid an act of the
state of Washington providing for
quarantine against alfalfa weevil,
applying to shipments coming in
from other states. The supreme
court decision, it is pointed out,
merely suspended the state act
pending the assuming of jurisdic-
tion by congress.
