"SMOKI PEOPLE" PREPARE FOR YEARLY SNAKE DANCE

PRESCOTT, Ariz., June 7.—(A. P.)—Capt. De la Cruz and a detachment of northern Arizona Indian troops, the "Smoki People," a "tribe" composed of nearly 100 Prescott business men, will appear in their snake dance performance at this community's "Way Out West" celebration June 11.

The ancient, tribal and what are considered by some as pagan rites among the Indians are being discouraged. For this reason the Smokis have adopted the dances to preserve them for posterity.

The Smokis have purchased 200 or more snakes for use in the Snake Dance.

Began in 1921 as a day of play for the community, the celebration since has been given over entirely to the presentation of a pageant program of a number of characteristic dances and ceremonies of Northern Arizona Indians. The Smokis have a costume and paraphernalia department which possesses more than \$12,000 in outfits made in exact reproduction of the ceremonial garb and equipment of the various tribes.

Since 1921 ten dances and ceremonies have been studied, dramatized and reproduced, but the Snake Dance, as it is called, always constitutes the finale of the program. The basic purpose of the Smoki People is to erect a museum and to engage, when financed, in the exploration of all manner of antiquities of the southwest.

ALL COUNTIES PAY FIRST HALF OF TAXES TO STATE

SALEM, Ore., June 7.—State Treasurer Kay today reported that all counties in the state had paid the first half of the state taxes for the year by June 5, the final date provided by law for that purpose. The total amount paid was \$2,515,877.87. Of this amount the general state tax is \$1,792,474.61, the one-half mill road fund \$512,268.83 and the one-half mill fund for war veterans' state aid \$271,134.43.

COLLEGE WEEKLIES IN NEW ENGLAND FORM 'LITTLE A. P.'

BOSTON, June 7.—(A. P.)—New England college weeklies have formed a "Little Associated Press." At the second convention of the New England Intercollegiate Newspaper Association, composed of weekly publications, the mediaeval papers adopted a plan to interchange news throughout their intercollegiate circuit.

The member papers, which all have practically the same publication date, are bound to put into the mails proof sheets or carbon copies of all articles of major importance. Added to this is the supplementary service, relayed from Boston, which consists of collected items of intercampus interest gleaned from the newspapers and from college exchanges.

The policy of the organization demands that all matter carried in the columns of the various papers in the circuit be of educational interest.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, June 7.—Snorishness and self-indulgence have killed the British Actors' association, declared G. Fisher-White, a former member of the council. The council resigned because the membership and funds were rapidly declining.

There is a strong tie of camaraderie between provincial and London actors," Mr. Fisher-White said. "We have failed to acquire in this country the comradely spirit which exists among the profession in America. Leading actors supported the association before 1919, when it first became a trade union, but since then they have gradually given it up. They object to being organized with stage hands and other theatrical employees."

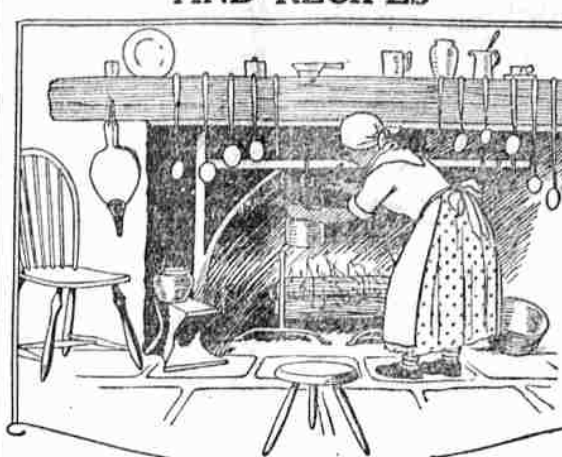
TRACING FOX GENOLOGY BACK TO ORIGINAL PAIR

The first herd statistics of American fox ancestry will be published this year by the American National Fox Breeders association. The record will comprise eight volumes, involving progenies of more than 100,000 domesticated foxes being ranches in the United States and Alaska.

FAVORITE CREOLE DISHES AND RECIPES



On a recent visit to New Orleans I secured some of the famous old Creole recipes which I was told had attained popularity throughout Louisiana. The early French settlers taught their negro servants many secrets of the expert cookery for which their nation is famous. The negro "mamies" added certain savory touches of their own. The dishes that resulted became known as "Creole."

I soon found that only by using prepared foods does the busy modern housewife have time for this elaborate cookery of a day when servants were plentiful.

Corn, Creole Style—Cook 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper in 4 tablespoons butter. Add 4 tablespoons flour and 1 cup canned tomato soup, stirring until smooth. Season with a little salt, onion juice and chopped parsley. Stir in 2 cups canned corn and heat thoroughly.

Monk That Made History

For the Herald was a monk of the famous Benedictine order, the Benedictines and primarily responsible for one of the most gigantic religious movements of the world ever known. The monk was born in 1050, when he preached the necessity of a crusade to wrest the Holy Land from the infidel. He rode about France on a mule, exhorting the people to follow him. In 1096 he set out toward Palestine with some thirty thousand followers, mostly of the poorer classes. The medieval army struggled on through Europe, but after crossing the Bosphorus in Asia Minor it proved so unruly that Peter left it and joined the army of Godfrey de Bouillon. He had a part in the capture of Jerusalem, and in July, 1099, preached on the Mount of Olives—Kansas City Star.

Socrates in Art

The British museum has recently come into possession of a statue, the head of which is in very good condition. It is considered by archaeologists to be almost certainly a portrait of Socrates as he walked and talked in the streets of Athens. It portrayed the familiar course face, the rough beard and the snub nose, but the result is not grotesque and there can be no doubt as to the intelligence of the sculptured figure. The statue is supposed to date from a period about a century later than Socrates. If so, it is the earliest portrait of him for all the other busts in existence belong to the Roman period.—London Post.
